Twenty English families are on their way to join the Lebanon Shakers.

Not half the usual number of letters are written in France since the high postage law has gone into operation.

Butler county, Kansas, claims a pumpkin vine 1,513 feet in length, on which were fifty-six pumpkins.

The Passaic Village Council offers \$50 reward for the apprehension of violators of the Bribery act at the approaching election.

At Ottumwa, at the late election, a Democrat voted a last year's printed ticket, saying he "didn't want any new departure in his'n."

A Vermonter one hundred years old, has come to the conclusion that it isn't healthy down east, and has gone to Detroit for permanent residence.

The young lady who advertised in New York, for every Christian to send her ten cents, got twenty. What a Sodom and Gomorrah that city must be.

Thirty-six base ball clubs contended one Sunday recently by friendly emulation, at the different open grounds in the suburbs of New Orleans.

In New Bedford, it is said, there is not a single open bar, and that every person rich or poor, who has been found engaged in the liquor traffic has been arraigned for so doing.

A fire occurred at Highspire on Tuesday night last, which destroyed the saw and planing mill of H. S. Wilson. The loss was about \$15,000. Insurance only \$5,000.

In Dayton, Ohio, a number of incendiary attempts were made to fire property within the past week. Shavings saturated with coal oil have been found under stairways in different portions of the city, where efforts had been made to fire them and failed.

David Boss was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of Charles Rose, at Bartleyville, Morris co., N. J. on Tuesday last week. A part of Boss' skull was blown off.

Andrew Stever, a farmer, living near Delphos, Ohio, was attacked on the 27th ult., by a robber who levelled a revolver at him. Stever struck up the pistol, and stabbed the robber to death with a pocket knife. A coroner's jury justified the act.

At a late term of court in Machias, Maine, in a prosecution for selling rum, the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty," plainly in defiance of the evidence, whereupon Judge Barrow told them, in so many words, that they were a disgrace to the county.

At Memphis, on the morning of the 31st ult. The crew of the steamer Mary Boyd mutinied. An attack was made on the mate, who shot a negro named John Kellon twice, severely. The timely arrival of the police saved the mate's life. Several of the rioters have been arrested, but the ringleaders escaped.

A Blacksmith in the employ of the Belvidere & Delaware Railroad Company, at their shops in Phillipsburg, has made the discovery of a new coupling for cars, which railroad men say is entirely different from anything they have ever seen in use, and which may supersede the old method. It is simple in construction and easily applied.

Rowland Wyes, fatally injured his wife in a drunken row at Sing Sing on Saturday night by knocking her down, jumping upon her, and breaking her back, and then throwing her over a fence. He has been committed to White Plains jail on charge of murder. The woman died on Monday morning.

Gentleman writing to the Department of Agriculture from Yalabusha county, Miss., says he planted onion seeds in May, expecting to get sets in the fall, but, to his surprise, he had gathered a fine crop of onions, some of them measuring fully thirteen inches in circumference. Some of our farmers would not care to be surprised in the same manner.

Charles W. Warren was accidentally killed by a gun in East Brookfield on the evening of 25th ult. In company with three others he went about four miles from the village on a con hunt, and having arrived in the field where they proposed to leave their teams, Warren went to the rear of the wagon, and taking a gun by the muzzle drew it toward him, when the hammer caught and the charge was lodged in his side. He died in about fifteen minutes.

Mrs. Ryder, of Norwalk, Conn., who was accused of perpetrating an abortion on the person of a Mrs. Stone, of the same place, has been acquitted by a jury, there having been no positive testimony to prove her guilt. The prosecution rested upon what was claimed to be the dying declarations of Mrs. Stone. Mr. Ryder's counsel objected to the introduction of the declarations as testimony, and the Judge sustained the objection.
