Cure for a Cold in the Head.

Dr. Paliod, of France, announces what he considers to be a new method of curing a cold in the head. It consists in inhaling through the nose the emanations of ammonia contained in a smelling bottle. If the sense of smell is completely obliterated, the bottle should be kept under the nose until the pungency of the volatile alkali is felt. The bottle is then removed, but is left. The bothe is then removed, but only to be reapplied after a minute; the second application, however, should not be long, that the patient may bear it.
