Artificial Milk. From the reports in circulation it would seem as if science were about to make cows superfluous. Artificial milk has been prepared by a French chemist from sugar, dried whites of eggs, carbonate of soda, olive-oil, and water.

Hints on Housekeeping. We will give to intellect, and to all virtues, the honor that belongs to them, and still it may be boldly affirmed that economy, taste, skill and neatness in the kitchen, have a great deal to do in making life happy and prosperous.

Planting Potatoes. Dr. Hexamer, of N. Y., gives a result of an experiment of planting the potatoes in seventeen different ways, and found the best results were given from one large potato, whole, in each hill; the next best from two large half potatoes cut lengthwise; next the seed end of a large potato; next from medium sized potato planted whole;

Artificial Mahogany. The surface is planed smooth, and the wood is then rubbed with a solution of citrous acid; one ounce of dragon's blood is dissolved in nearly a pint of spirits of wine; this, and one-third of an ounce of carbonate of soda, are then to be mixed together and filtered, and the liquid in this thin state is to be laid on with a soft brush.

Hot Cakes. A griddle for baking cakes should never be greased, as apart from the annoyance caused by the smoke arising from a greased griddle, the delicate flavor of the cakes is destroyed.
