Here it was ascertained that underneath her feminine attire, she was clad in a complete suit of male clothing. The women had their sign out, at their rooms, as dressmakers. A large portion of the property was recovered in the apartment. It is believed that these two have made way, in the course of a few months, with no less than eighteen or twenty thousand dollars'worth of silks and

#### Swallowed a Tooth.

It baffled attempts to dislodge it until Dr. Smith probed for it, reaching with an instrument some ten or twelve inches down the patient's throat. The obstruction was reached and drawn up to the entrance of the throat, when by a great effort Miss Squire coughed it out.

#### A Funeral Congregation and the Corpse Fall into a Cellar.

The Elmira (N. Y.) Advertiser of February 2d says: "Yesterday afternoon the funeral of Ellen Grady took place at the house of John M'Nevins, on Railroad avenue, near First street. Hostility to the Jews.

Advices received in London, state that the Jewish persecution in Roumania is incrersing. Large numbers of Jews daily fall victims to the hatred of the native inhabitants, over whom the authorities exercise no control. Murder in public is frequent and unpunished. Uunfortunate Israelites are subjected to every species of indignity and prosecution their enemies can devise. Their dwellings are fired by riotous mobs, and lives are not unfrequently sacrificed to complete the holacaust. Relentless persecution has compelled many to leave the territory. Numbers of these refugees are blacing themselves under Turkish protection. In the city of Kabul the persecution has been developed in the bloodiest aspect. Seventy Israelites, including defenseless woman and children, have fallen victims to oppression. . Thirtyfive were wounded, many fatally.

During a terrible hurricane in Lon. don, recently, a large piece of stone, weighing two tons, was blown off the centre lower of the House of Parliament. Many craft were lost in the Thames, and there were numerous street accidents.
