The following information to ascertain the age of a horse, after it has passed the ainth year, is quite new to us, and will be to the most of our readers. After the horse is nine years old, a wrinkle comes on the cyclid, at the upper corner of the lower lid, and every year thereafter he has one welldefined wrinkle for each year of his age over uine. If for instance, a horse has three wrinkles, he is twelve. Add the number of wrinkles to nine, and you will always get at his age.

(3" My experience in leached ashes for sweet potatoes the past year has taught me that there is no better fertilizer for sweet potatoes than leached ashes, even on very poor soil. The ashes are placed in furrows covered with soil, and the potatoes planted thereon. My crop was most excellent, where, without the ashes, I could hardly have made any. Soil, saudy loam. W. B.

Advices in Cases of Poisoning.

Stir in a glass of water a heaping teaspoonful each of salt and mustard, and drink immediately. One or more doses will empty and cleanse the stomach. To overcome the effects, swallow the whites of two or three eggs, and drink a cup or two of strong coffee.

Marking Ink for Parcels.

Dissolve asphaltum, grahamite, albertite, or any mineral of this character in naptha er oil of turpentine, to a thin fluid, and you will obtain an ink to answer all your surposes, viz., to dry quickly, not to spread, and the marking to be nearly inde-Azuctable.

To Clean Bottles.
