Sentenced.—Shaffner who was convicted of wife murder at the recent court in Harrisburg, was on Wednesday last, sentenced to be hung, a new trial being denied.

The Legislature is rushing business through as rapidly as possible. The day now set for their final adjournment is Thursday of this week.

Arrested for Forgery.—On last week Monday, Dr. Jacob Ritter, of Liverpool was arrested charged with forgery in order to draw the pension of his mother-in-law, who has been dead about two years.

Turned Over.—The train due at Newport at 6.16 on Monday evening, did not reach there until 11 o'clock, giving some of our citizens a long wait.

Small-Pox at New Buffalo.—The portion of the county around New Buffalo has been considerably afflicted with the small-pox, several deaths having occurred from that disease.

Duncannon & Bloomfield R. R.—The following is a copy of the act incorporating the D. B. & L. railroad.

Section 1st. Be it enacted, &c., That George Hench, Jacob Bixler, Samuel Gutsball, W. W. McClure, James M'Neal, John A. Magee, John A. Baker, B. F. Jenkin, John R. Shuler, John H. Sheibly, John Jones, William R. Swartz, O. B. Ellis, John Alister, Jr. James Swartz, of Perry county, or any five of them are appointed commissioners to open books, receive subscriptions, and organize a company with power to construct a railroad from or near the borough of Duncannon, in the county of Perry, by the way of Bloomfield to Loyville in Tyrone township in the county of Perry.

Section 2d. The capital stock in said company shall consist of two thousand shares of fifty dollars each, provided, That the said company may from time to time by a vote of the stockholders at a meeting called for that purpose, increase the capital stock if it be deemed necessary to an amount sufficient to carry out the true intent and meaning of this act.

Section 3d. That when any section of five miles of said road shall be completed, the said company may use, employ and enjoy the same in the same manner, as when the entire road shall be constructed.

By the thoughtfulness of Senator Crawford, the act as passed by the House was amended, by the addition of a clause giving the company all the privileges granted by the general railroad law of 1849. The house concurred in the amendment, and the act will undoubtedly receive the Governor's approval.

We trust these commissioners will show the citizens of the county that they mean to have a railroad built, and as some of the persons named in the act of incorporation are first men, there is reason to hope for favorable action.

COMMUNICATED. DUNCANNON, March 30, 1872.

Mr. Editor.—In consequence of the recent fires the citizens of this place held a couple of meetings to decide what to do in the matter. Two committees were appointed, one to wait on Mr. S. A. Black, Supt., Middle Division, P. C. R. R. and the other to solicit subscriptions for money, to purchase buckets, ladders and hooks. The first committee reported that the R. R. Co. were disposed to do the square thing, and were aware of the fact, that more fire escaped from the stacks, than agreed with property holders health here, and that they would remedy the matter as soon as possible, that they were then substituting new stacks for the old ones. The second committee is still on duty. The citizens also resolved themselves into a fire brigade, and appointed a committee to draw up constitution and by-laws, and report next Tuesday evening. A petition to be presented to the Legislature, is now in circulation, asking that the Town Council of Duncannon, be empowered to levy an additional tax of 5 mills, the present tax of five mills not being sufficient for ordinary expenses.

Judging from the number of signatures, the measure proposed is popular though I suppose "Again" will fail to see it. There was only four fires on Friday, all slight, and those starting from sparks thrown out by the locomotives. The engine that runs the plate and bar mills is broken, so the factory is still idle.

Several flocks of wild geese (not swans) passed over this place to-day. It was not a big thing on ice in the duck-line either. KNICKERBOCKER.
