Russia is about to re-open Sebastopol as a military and naval harbor, to construct docks for repairing vessels of war and to protect the neighboring bays and inlets for fortifications.

London, April 2.—While the races at Lurgan, Ireland, were in progress, the stand crowded with spectators gave way, and about 200 persons were precipitated to the ground amid the confused mass of broken timbers.

Madrid, April 1st.—A band of robbers last week removed rails on the Madrid and Andalusia Railway, between Valdepenas and Manzanares, and stopped the mail train.

Paris, April 3.—A great Bonapartist reaction is now in progress throughout France, and its believed a political crisis is at hand. During the past few months the influx of Bonapartist leaders has been unusually large, and their agents have been industriously engaged in canvassing various districts with immense success.

Showers of Worms.

Mr. George W. Lawson, of Somerville, Mass., who noticed the singular phenomenon of a shower of worms on the 15th ult., sent some specimens to the Museum of Comparative Zoology at Cambridge, and has received the following interesting reply from Mr. Thomas Cary of that institution:

I have received your letter containing a specimen of the worms which you saw "apparently falling with the snow" during the storm of the 15th inst. I have shown the specimen to Dr. Hagen, who says it is the larva of a beetle belonging to the family Telephoridae, and probably to the species Chaetognathus Pennsylvanicus.

In Sweden, Germany, and in the mountainous parts of France, numbers of the larvae of these insects, together with other living insects, mostly Poduridae, have been found, and were supposed to have fallen with the snow, but the phenomenon has never been satisfactorily explained.

A Remarkable Escape.

On Friday night a week, three convicts succeeded in escaping from Blackwell's Island, by means that would do credit to criminals of greater fame. By their good conduct they had won the confidence of the prison authorities, and were transferred to the hospital, where their duties were very light.
