FARM AND HOUSEHOLD ITEMS

Scripture and Agriculture.

The following practical commentary on a familiar passage of Scripture, we find in the Country Gentleman:

"How many sneered at J. J. Thomas' recommendation in the case of pear tree blight, 'that we should dig up the blighted tree and plant a healthy one in its place,' yet it is the only practical-way to this day, if you wish to keep up a pear orchard. Indeed, J. J. Thomas was not the first to recommend the cutting down of a worthless tree. Go to that good book which tells you that man was sent forth to till the earth and earn his bread by the sweat of his brow—which is emphatically true in case of successful horticulturists to this day; and you will find that 4,000 years after man had gone forth and tilled the earth, the owner of a certain vineyard told his gardener to cut down a barren fig tree. The gardener asked for but a single year that he might dig about it and dung it. Now what sounder horticultural doctrine than that? If any of you have a tree of bearing age, that does not bear, and you write to a horticultural editor for advice (if he understands his business, he will tell you to 'dig about it and dung.' Dig around it, cutting the roots to check the wood-growth, and compel it to form fruit buds, and manure it to assist in bearing the shock caused by the cutting of the roots, while it is in a growing state, the very method of root-pruning that Thos. Rivers practised 30 or 40 years ago, to throw his pear tree into early bearing before he commenced working them on quince stocks.

A Butter Tree.

Tallow trees, milk trees, pitcher trees and bread trees are found in various parts of the world. They are no longer a wonder. But a new discovery in a part of Africa not frequently visited by travellers has been announced that quite eclipses anything in the tree line. It is a tree yielding butter. According to M. Cheval, the product consists of a small proportion of aromatic principle, ocline and stearine, very much like mutton tallow. At 120 degrees Fahrenheit it is liquid becoming turpid at 100 with globules floating through the mass. It is a poor substitute for butter, yet there is an approximation so that an amateur would pronounce it strong—the regular boarding house article. Salt improves it but under no system of treatment can it be introduced to take the place of that churned from milk. When heated slightly the new product is easily converted into soap with a solution of potash or soda, and this becomes inodorous. Probably this new article may have some future commercial value in the manufacture of saponaceous compounds and mixing with ordinary butter on the principle of putting sand in sugar.

Secret of Health.

First, keep warm. Second, eat regularly and slowly. Third, maintain regular bodily habits. Fourth, take early and very light suppers. Fifth, keep a clean skin. Sixth, get plenty of sleep at night. Seventh, keep cheerful and respectable company. Eighth, keep out of debt. Ninth, don't set your mind on things you don't need. Tenth, mind your own business. Eleventh, don't set up to be a sharp of any kind. Twelfth, subdue curiosity. Thirteenth, avoid drugs.—Mercury.

Sugar Biscuits.

Dissolve one teacupful of white sugar in a quart of new milk, then stir in a pint of yeast, with sifted flour enough to make a stiff sponge, let it rise until very light, then work into a sponge three quarters of a pound of melted butter, with sifted flour enough to make a stiff dough; work the dough thoroughly, cut into biscuits, let them stand on buttered tins to rise, sift sugar on each, and bake in a quick oven.

Valuable Hints.

Salt stimulates digestion. Onions are the best vegetables known to correct bad blood. Ice cream produces acute dyspepsia in consumptive patients. Cracked wheat, boiled or cooked as rice, is a good diet for dyspepsia. Ice held in the mouth will quench thirst in cholera, cholera morbus and fever.

Linen may be thoroughly cleaned, with none of the injurious results attending the use of soda and other washing powders by soaking it about three hours in a mixture composed of two pounds of soap dissolved in 5 gallons of nearly boiling water to which is added three large table spoonfuls of ammonia and one of spirits of turpentine. A little rubbing afterward does the business.

Mr. Calvin Colton, of Aurora, Ill., last month took from thirty swarms of bees, a little over 8,000 pounds of strained honey. It was extracted by a machine invented for that purpose.

We are told that Rancid Butter may be restored by washing in lime water.
