FARM AND HOUSEHOLD ITEMS

For all communications from all persons who are in the habit of writing properly belonging to this department.

Farmers North and South.

The marked contrast between the modes of culture of the farmer of the North and planter of the South is not to be traced to any essential difference in the principles by which the cultivation of the earth should govern the one or the other, but is rather to be accounted for by the circumstances of these localities. Climate has had much to do with the subject, the character of labor more, and the education and habits of the respective populations greatly conduced to the essential differences in the practical operations of the farm.

In Southern States it is as uncommon to meet with a barn, as a place of preparation of the products of the plantation, as it is in the North to find a farm without one. The planter contents himself with the reflection that his cattle require no such shelter from the elements with which he is surrounded; while the farmer estimates his barn, not only for a shelter for his cattle from the cold, but as a manufactory of the only fertilizers upon which he relies to improve his land; and not only this, but a place where his products are prepared for market without waste or deterioration, and from whence the straw, hay, and fodder are distributed to the cattle for their comfort and for the profit of the farmer. The southern farmer will not realize the truth of this, although he finds himself scattering over a thousand acres; abandoning one spot with the hope of finding another less exhausted, and perhaps somewhat rested from fatigues of acres of crops of the same thing; while the northern farmer with his well-farmed hundred acres, will be found to increase the fertility of his land and add to his acres year by year. We have almost said that a barn is essential to the operations of the farm; that it is through its instrumentality that it is fertilized and improved; while the manure of the barless plantation is wasted upon the desert air.

A Chinese Kitchen.

Some of our lady readers would like, no doubt to take a glance at a Chinese kitchen, which is a wonder in its way.—

There is nothing in it but a cookingstove or two, not larger than our American water-pail with a few stew-pans, and many chop-sticks, from which few things come the many courses of the table, all well cooked and garnished—nay, even the best of beef-steak, so difficult to have cooked well at home. The more I go over the world, the more I am convinced that American and Englishmen are far behind the rest of creation in preparing their food to be eaten. Our "civilization" in this is over a hundred years behind the age; and in this the Chinese are far our superiors. That devil's invention of ours, the kitchen-range ought to be kicked down; where it came from, the lower regions—an invention which in summer, roasts us out of our houses, and in winter consumes as much coal in a day as a Chinaman would need in a month, or a Frenchman in a week. Some rich man in America, some coming Peter Cooper in lieu of teaching us how to draw, would do better to found a college to teach us how to boil potatoes, cook beefsteak, roast mutton and bake bread, for such a Peter Cooper would be the very greatest of American human benefactors.

Earth Poitices.

"As the season of bites of reptiles is near, I send you a simple and easily obtained remedy for stings or bites. It is a plaster of clay, or instead of clay, common swamp or gutter mud, applied as soon as possible to the wound. I have tried it on myself. In one case, I was stung, by a numerous swarm of the yellow hornets, in many places on my neck and arms. I went to a swamp near the poison being so severe that my sight was much affected. I immediately applied the mud, and, in half an hour, I went to mowing again, with only a small lump around each sting. I knew a neighbor who was bitten by a rattle-snake some miles from home; his companion left him and went for help as fast as possible, it being just night. He was not able to return until morning. When going, he met the man returning, with the poison conquered. He had got to a swamp, dug a hole with his tomahawk, inserted and buried the bitten place in the mud. That was all."

Col. Thomas F. Hueston, of Pettis county, Mo., recently sold 10,000 bushels of wheat at \$2 per bushel which he raised himself. Last fall he only sowed 275 acres in wheat, and on account of the drought at seeding time he says that not over 75 acres will be worth harvesting. His main crop this season will be corn, of which he is planting 1600 acres—He owns 5000 acres of the choicest land in Pettis county. So says a paper published in his neighborhood.
