


He however lived to see the opinion of the pub lie advanced beyond the position he had once occupied, and to find many persons regarding him with suspicion, as a man who had deserted principles he had so long advocated. After resigning the charge of the State Department, he took a trip around the world, and received much attention by the rulers and public men in all the countries he visited. At the time of his death Mr. S. was engaged in preparing a work descriptive of his journey. He was a native of Orange County N. Y. and was born May 16, 1801.

#### RECENT ELECTIONS.

CONTECTICUT.

In Connecticut the election resulted in a large Democratic gain the State giving a Liberal Republican and Democratic majority of several thousand.

PENNSYLVANIA.

In this State the Republicans carried the State by over 32,000.

#### INDIANA.

#### NEWBRASKA.

At the election held in Nebraska on Tuesday last the Republicans elected their entire ticket, by a majority of several thousand.

Startling Experiments with Electricity.

John Barelay was hung at Columbus, Ohio, on Friday the 10th, and in twentythree and a half minutes after the trap on which he stood had fallen, his body was on the demonstrator's table at the Startling medical college, in the presence of a number of physicians and spectators. #### A Liquor Case.

The first case under the new liquor law, in Illinois which makes the seller of liquor responsible for the result, has just been commenced. Some months ago, Martin Meyers, a master mechanic on the Chicago and Danville railroad, was killed during a drunken melec. He had been drinking in the saloon, on North Rocker street, and in a political dispute he was struck by Mack with a fatal blow. The jury failed to find a bill of indictment against Mack. This enaed the criminal proceeding. A new action is brought under the new liquor law against Mack as the owner of the saloon, and against a boy as owner of the premises

where the liquor was sold to the deceased. The widow claims \$10,000 for damages, tim resided.
