Mr. Editor.—As I see some letters in your valuable paper in regard to improvements in the far west, I think it is proper to inform the readers of your paper, of the improvements in this section of our own state.

The Bennetts branch which connects this road with the Alleghany Valley road is being completed very fast, which when completed will throw quite an amount of trade over this road.

It is rumored that the Cattawissa Co., intend extending their road on the opposite side of the river to connect with the Atlantic & Great Western road, and it is anticipated there will be quite an amount of improvement here next summer.

There is some kind of an epidemic among the deer in this section of the country. Some hunters found five dead ones at one place, and others found one or two at another.
