FARM AND HOUSEHOLD ITEMS

Keep the Cattle Growing.

The most successful breeders of horses, cattle, sheep or swine, know from experience that although they may possess the best animals for breeding, they will not be successful in producing superior stock if a continual growth of young animals is not kept up. In order to begin in time at this indispensable preparation of success, the brood mares, cows, ewes and sows are most carefully and suitably fed while with young, and as soon as the young animals make their appearance, they are taken the greatest care of, the dams being suitably fed while sucking, and when the young ones are weaned, they are not supposed to want for food or drink a single honr. By this means a continuous or rapid growth is kept up, and the animals attain a large size and heavy weight at an early age. When breeding animals are not properly fed and comfortably sheltered in winter, the bad effect of such treatment is not conrained to their want of condition-it is shared by their progeny and can never be remedied. When young stock is not well fed and comfortably sheltered in winter their growth becomes stunted and no subsequent amount of treatment can repair the damage. Young animals may suffer for want of proper provender in summer and autumn as in winter and when this happens it stops continuous growth and prevents ultimate success in the objects of the breed-

Coal-Ashes in Poultry Houses.

"Dry earth is unquestionably the best thing in the world for the dusting-bin. It may be procured with very little trouble during a dry spell in summer. But if not attended to at the proper season, or if the supply gives out, then coal-ashes are a very good substitute. One great merit which they possess is, that as taken from the steve or furnace they are so very dry. The dust bin in the fowl house should be so arranged as to not gather dampness from the ground for the drier its contents can be kept the better. Coal-ashes should be furnished in a separate box, in case the dust bin is filled with dry earth, for the ashes contain bits of burnt slate and other earthy matter greedily devoured by fowls in winter, and which serve to promote appetite and digestion, and contain materials for the formation of egg-shells. Woodashes have been recommended for fowls to roll in, as it is said the potash they contain is noxious to vermin. No doubt but it is too caustic for the feet and skin of the fowls, and in wet weather forms a biting lye .-Hens will not wallow in wood-ashes when dry earth is accessible, and they ought to have something to say in the matter."-Poultry World.

Pulling at the Halter.

A year ago I had a four-year old horse which contracted the habit of pulling back whenever she was fastened. She would be sure to break loose if what held her could be broken by her drawing in such a backward way. She was cured of the habit by taking a rope two feet long, fastening one end around her body just behind her shoulders, and passing the other end through the ring of the halter and tying it to the post. She lay back for her usual pull for a few times when fixed in this way but soon found she was drawing from her body instead of her head, which she did not relish, and soon gave it up entirely. She can now be left anywhere in perfect safety, as nothing will induce her to pull back when fastened .- Cor. of Country Gentleman.

Mixed Grain.

An eastern farmer says: It has been our custom for several years to sow a mixture of oats and wheat for feeding stock, two bushels of oats and one of wheat to the nere. The yield in bushels is greater. The quality of the product is very superior; the wheat is very plump; it makes a heavy, rich and nutritious feed for stock. Peas and oats are frequently sown together, to be used as feed for young stock. Nothing is better as a flesh-forming food. Oats and barley are also raised together. We should suppose the barley would rigen and burst the shell before the oats would mature. It is said the barley is retarded in ripening by the shade of the oats, so that both reach maturity at the same time.
