Railroad Accident. There was a collision of two freight trains, opposite Liverpool on Friday evening, about 9 o'clock. One fireman was burnt into a crisp. The two engineers and two other persons were seriously, but it is supposed, not fatally in-jured. It is reported that the fireman that was killed, resided at Marysville.

Between them they tried to pass each other on a single track, and the above is the result.


