Wm. M. Sutch, Esq., has been elected a Justice of the Peace in this borough, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of John R. Shuler, Esq.

The Rain of Saturday raised the streams to an alarming extent. The only damages, we have yet had reported was the carrying away of some fences.

At Ickesburg, the water came down from the mountain in such force, that the streets and sidewalks were flooded, and cellars and lower floors in some cases were under water.

The Legislature.—Among the legislative proceedings last week, we find that the following bills of local interest were introduced and favorably reported from the committee:

To change the maximum rate of road tax in the township of Toboyn, Perry county.

To prevent cattle, horses, sheep and hogs from running at large in Wheatfield twp., Perry county.

To require the commissioners of Perry county to pay Michael Hartzel, contractor, for making a certain road in Howe township, said county, as committed.

A bill to prevent hogs running at large in the county of Perry, has also been introduced in the legislature.

Railroad Accident.—There was a collision of two freight trains, opposite Liverpool on Friday evening, about 9 o'clock. One fireman was burnt into a crisp. The two engineers and two other persons were seriously, but it is supposed, not fatally injured.

The down train was loaded with coal, the up train with dry goods, &c. The cars took fire and nearly all the cars going northward were destroyed with their contents. There is a siding at Millersburg and one also opposite Liverpool.
