Culture of Cranberries.

Where do all the cranberries come from, is a question often asked; and, on investigation, we are fairly astonished to witness the remarkable amount of business now transacted in this small fruit.

The consumption of this fruit is extending rapidly into all parts of the world; is becoming more and more a household necessity. New Jersey raises the largest bulk of cranberries in this country.

To Prevent the Decay of Shingles.

The following is said to effectually prevent decay in shingles:—Take the potash kettle, or large tub, and put into it one barrel of lye of wood-ashes, five pounds of white vitriol, five pounds of alum, and as much salt as will dissolve in the mixture.

Cherry Trees.

These should never be highly manured. Singular as it may seem, better results have been obtained by growing cherry trees in grass than by cultivating them as high pears.

Chapped Hands.

The easiest and simplest remedy for chapped hands is found in every store room. Take common starch and pulverize with the blade of a knife until reduced to the smoothest powder.

Iron bolts in wooden structures are always liable to be attacked by rust, which diminishes their size and loosens their hold. The simple remedy of coating the bolt holes with a mixture of zinc filings and grease galvanizes the iron and thus preserves it from oxidation.
