The payment of SIX DOLLARS on application, FIVE DOLLARS annually for FOUR YEARS, and thereafter TWO DOLLARS annually during life, with pro-rata mortality assessment at the death of each member, which for the FIRST CLASS is as follows:

A member, or his heirs, may name a successor; but if notice of the death of a member to the Secretary is not accompanied with the name of a successor, then the Society will put in a successor and fill the vacancy, according to the Constitution of the Society.

Should the member die before his four payments of five dollars are made, the remaining unpaid part will be deducted from the one Thousand Dollars due his heirs; his successor will then pay only two dollars annually during his lifetime, and the mortality assessments.

A Murder—Its Defense.

Sometime ago a farmer named Samuel went into the office of E. A. Marchant, in San Francisco, and shot him down while he was counting money at his desk, and then walked out and gave himself up. We noted the fact at the time. Samuel has been in jail ever since, until a few days ago, when the Grand Jury set him free, failing to find a bill against him. Samuel himself made a statement before the jury, and he had seventeen witnesses to substantiate it.

There was more, but the gentlemen of the jury had heard enough. They told Samuel to go, and they felt like giving him a medal for having performed a great service to society by killing Marchant. It is one of the most terrible stories of wrong ever heard, as the truth may be hinted as well as told. Samuel had two daughters, Emma and Ida, pretty school girls, one 15 and the other 14 years old.

One was at a boarding-school and the other went to school in San Francisco, and lived in Marchant's family. It is sufficient to say that Marchant had got both these girls completely and entirely in his power. Marchant's letters to the one in the seminary, of some of which Samuel had obtained possession, revealed the state of that case. The other was just as bad, and both exhibited a most depraved system of treachery and abuse of hospitality practiced ever since the oldest girl was 9 years old.

The father recalled both of his daughters home, and sent word to Marchant that he never wanted to see him again. Marchant paid him a visit, however, and seemed determined to keep up his intimacy with the family. Samuel's wife, the girls' mother, is in Texas, insane; and, as his daughter's only protector, he went to San Francisco on purpose, and walked into Marchant's office and shot. The Grand Jury could not see any murder in such an act of family defense as this.

Arctic Region Trophies.

Among the achievements of the Polaris expedition are trophies belonging to the animal world, and a lot of marine fossils, collected by Captain Tyson on the plains, ravines and highest of the mountains situated near Robson's Channel. The conclusion drawn by him from his investigation of these fossils is that the place where they were found was once the bed of a sea. He also discovered three shell fish, or snails, petrified, but otherwise perfect, and a petrified piece of wood.

All these are now on board the Tigress. This neighborhood abounded at times in the musk-ox, about twenty-four of which species were killed by different persons—twelve of them by Captain Tyson. One only was killed the first year, but the track of many more were seen. Besides these evidences of animal life, there were hunting utensils, hatchets, and marks of encampments, supposed to be left from the hunting expeditions of the Esquimaux in this quarter, but not recently. No traces of any permanent residence were to be seen, while one of its infallible indices, the presence of the dead bodies of the tribe, was wanting.

A curious feature in the habits of these people is that they never bury the dead, as is customary with nearly all the rest of the world, excepting those who burn them, nor do they trouble themselves in the least to conceal the last resting place of their relation or friends, to protect it from the outrage of bird, beast or reptile. He is simply left upon the surface of the snow, ice or ground to rot or be devoured by the wolf or the carnivorous animals of the deep should they come within reach.

The Tornado in Iowa.

The last reports from the scene of the tornado in Washington county, Iowa, make the number killed ten, and wounded twenty-two. About half as many were killed and wounded in Keokuk. Some of the injured are hurt internally and fatally. Others have legs and arms broken.

The more the catastrophe is investigated the greater appears its horrors. About 2,000 people from all parts of the country around about, visited different parts of the scene Monday afternoon. One of them found a note for \$500, belonging to Mr. Babcock, some two miles from the house and returned it.

The clergy of Washington preached almost exclusively about the disaster and attendant sorrows on Sabbath morning. Rev. Mr. Williamson, of the First Presbyterian Church, claims that it was a special Providence sent on the people for their sins. One of them belongs to the church, and nearly all the others were church people which makes the sermon rather severe.

A meeting is to be held there to see what can be done toward establishing a relief fund. Some of the farmers are left penniless, and such means will undoubtedly be furnished as to give them a fresh start.

A thrifty Vermont widow, finding some delay in the burial of her late husband, owing to the caving in of the ground, rather than waste time, went to the minister's house and was married to another husband, and returned to finish the burial of the first.
