The Game and Fish Laws.

The legislature at the late session consolidated and revised the game and fish laws of this Commonwealth. The following are the enactments as revised:

Deer can be killed from the 1st of September to the 1st of Jacuary.-Penalty for a violation, \$50.

Squirrels, from the 1st of July to the 1st of January. Penalty for violation, \$5. Rabbits, from October 1st to February Penalty for violation, \$10.

Wild Turkeys, from Gctober 1st to Janmary 1st. Penalty for violation, \$25. Genss Plover, from August 1st to Jan--nary 1st. Penalty for violation, \$10.

Gray Snipe, from September 1st to April Penalty for violation, \$10. Woodcock, from August 1st to January

dat. Penalty for violation, \$10. Quail and Partridge, from November

1st to January 1st. Penalty for violation, Pheasants and Prairie Chickens, from

from September 1st to January 1st .- Penalty for violation, \$10.

Rail and Reed Birds, from September 1st to November 80th. Penalty for violation. 65.

Night-hawks, whippoorwills, sparrows, thrushes, lark, finch, martins, chimney swallows, barn swallows, woodpeckers, flickers, robins, orioles, red or cardinal birds, cedar birds, tanagers, eat birds, blue birds, or any other insectiverous birds, caunot be killed at all, except for scientific purposes. Penalty for violation, \$5.

The penalty for destroying the nests or eggs of any birds, except such as destructive game and sectiverous birds, is \$10.

The penalty for killing or discharging firearms at wild pigeons while on their nesting ground or roostings, is \$25.

The penalty for trapping wild turkeys, pheasants, partridges, woodcock, reed or rail birds, is \$10.

The penalty for shooting or henting on Sunday is not less than \$10 nor more than

The penalty for throwing any cules or ceal dirt into the rivers, lakes, pends or

or streams, is \$30.

Fishing for trout in any way other than by hook and line is prohibited. Penalty for violation, \$25. Not even the owner of a trout pend has the privilege of catching his trout otherwise, except for the purpose of supplying other ponds.

Treut can be caught from April 1st to August 15th. Poualty for violation, \$10. Salmon trout or lake trout can be caught from February 1st to October 1st. Penalty

for wiolation, \$10. The penalty for trespassing upon lands to fish, after notices posted by the owner, is \$100.

The pounty for placing set-nets across any canals, rivulets or creeks, is \$25.

The penalty for placing lime or other deleterious substances in any water, to injure or kill fish, is \$50 and imprisonment not exceeding three months, or either.

Black bass, pike and pickerel can only be caught by book and line, and in that way only from June 1st to March 1st. Penalty for violation, \$25.

Fishing by means of drawing off the waters of any dam or race, is prohibited under a penalty of \$25.

Justices, aldermen and judges of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace are authorized to issue warrants for the arrest of offenders, the officer making the arrest is made a competent witness, the informer is entitled to half the penalty, and the other half goes to the county treasury. (Constables and police officers are required to make information where violations are known by them, and the limitation of action is fixed at six months from the com-

Remarkable Escape.

The following beats all the stories of remarkable escapes which we remember ever so-have seen:-" On the passage of the ship Alexander from New Orleans to New York a youngilad, about fourteen years of age from a naturally frolicsome and mischievous disposition, became so troublesome in his pranks, that he was threatened by the captain, if they were continued, that he would confine him in a water-cask. Our youngster took no heed, however, and, at his next offence, was put in the cask, which was headed up, leaving a large bung-hole for the admission of air. That night the ship encountered a violent storm, and, in a sudden lurch, the eask containing the boy rolled over into the sea. The circumstance was not noticed by those on board. Fortunately the cask struck bung up, and floated about thirty hours, when it was thrown upon the beach at St. Blas. Here the boy made desperate efforts to extricate himself from his prison, without success, and, in despair, gave up to die. Some cows, however, strolling on the beach, were attracted to the cask, and, in walking around it, one of them, it being fly-time, switched her tail into the bung-hole, which the lad grasped with a desperate resolution. The cow bellowed and set off for life, and after running some two hundred yards with the cask, struck it against a log on the beach, and knocked it, as we say, into a "cocked hat." The boy, thus providentially released, was discovered by some fishermen. on the point and taken into Appalachicola, where a small coflection being made for him, he was enabled to proceed north by the way of Columbus,"

The guardian of a minor child of a soldier who heretofore only received \$5.00 per month pension is now entitled to \$10. per moth.
Soldiers who receive invalid pensions can now have their pensions increased to any sum or rate between \$8. and \$15. per month.
Soldiers who have lost their discharges can now obtain duplicates.

Fathers and mothers who lost sons in the service upon whom they were dependent for support, can also obtain pensions.
