Terrible Domestic Tragedy.

Winchester, Va., July 7 .- A terrible tragedy occurred on Saturday morning at the residence of Franklin Little, a very highly respected citizen of Clarke county, Va., about seven miles from this place, in which six brothers, Clinton, Columbus, Gilbert, Oscar, Wallace, and Lycurgus were involved. It seems that the brothers have been at variance for some time, the cause being jealousy that has existed directly between the oldest brothers, Clinton, Oscar and Lycurgus.

On Saturday morning as part of the family were at breakfast, Oscar and Lycurgus entered the dining room, locked the door after them, one putting the key in his pocket. Then one of them took a seat near the door; the other off from the table. Oscar, addressing himself to Clinton, said that they had nothing against him and did not want him to interfere in what they were about to do. Clinton jumped from his seat, but before he could speak Oscar and Lycurgus drew their revolvers and aimed at him and the rest of the family at the table and fired, wounding Clinton and their mother. The fight then became general among all the brothers, lasting some minutes. All were severely wounded except Wallace. By this time some of the belligerants had gotten outside the house.

Lycurgus and Oscar started to run. Columbus drew a revolver and fired at the murderous brothers without effect, the distance being too great. Gilbert who was standing near ran into the house and brought a rifle, fired at Oscar at long range, wounding him in the leg. He was captured by Columbus and Gilbert and held until the arrival of neighbors. He was taken to Berryville and lodged in jail,

Clinton died after lingering a couple of hours in intense agony. The mother is in a critical condition. A post mortem examination of the body of Cliaton was held by Drs. Somerville, Miller and Wilson. Internal hemorrhage was found to be the cause of death, the ball entering above the right hip bone and lodging in the left knee. A coroner's inquest was held, and a verdict rendered that "Clinton Little came to his death by a pistol shot, fired premeditatedly by his brother Lycurgus." The examination will take place at Berryville, Monday. The excitement is great in Clarke county against the brothers Oscar and Lycurgus.

Mysterions Correspondence.

Regularly every two weeks, for the past six years, a letter has been received at the postoffice in Manchester, N. H., addressed to Dr. -, evidently by the same hand. The caligraphy is good, and is evidently that of a lady. The name is entered on the list, time after time, and no one has ever claimed them. After lying at the office the time specified by law, the letters are sent, one after the other, to the deadletter office at Washington. On one occasion one of the letters was returned from the dead-letter office, because it contained some trifle of lace, which the department was desirous should be returned to the writer. The writer gave no clew as to who or what the writer was, and was signed simply "Emeline."

This name was entered on the list, but no one over claimed the letter or the bits of lace. Another strange feature of this case is that the "oldest inhabitant" has never heard of any man of the name the letters bear, and so the whole matter remains a mystery, year after year.

A Terrible Explosion.

Seventy kegs of nitroglyicerine and seven hundred barrels of giant powder, which were stored in one of the buildings belonging to the Cambria Coal and Mining Company, whose establishment is situated about one mile from the village of Batesville, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, exploded on the third of July. In the village the houses rocked as if an earthquake had come that way; the breaking of windowlights and the cries of frightened women and children were mingled in one horrible din, while at the scene of the explosion no trace could be found of the building, the barrels, the hoops or the nitro-glycerine and powder. For a distance of five or six hundred yards around the spot where the building stood the earth itself had been dug out in huge trenches sixty or seventy feet deep; great trees had been lifted, roots and all, from the places where they had been growing for years, and removed long distances, while others were almost buried under the vast quantity of flying dirt .- N. Y. Herald.

Life in Kentucky.

At Owingsville, Kentucky, on the 3d, inst., William G. Satterfield was placed on for burning that place in April last. While one Hayden was testifying in regard to being employed by Satterfield to burn the place, a brother of Satterfield and his friends rushed towards him with revolvers in hand, when several determined citizens interfered and averted a collision. The court then adjourned. The next day Satterfield and his friends rode into town, with double-barreled shot guns and revolvers, and were met by Mr. Hoon, the jailer, and other citizens, Hoon fired at Satterfield, killing him instantly, when the rest of the party fied. Satterfield has been reregarded us a desperate character, and his death is not much regretted by law-abiding
