

Terrible Domestic Tragedy.

Winchester, Va., July 7.—A terrible tragedy occurred on Saturday morning at the residence of Franklin Little, a very highly respected citizen of Clarke county, Va., about seven miles from this place, in which six brothers, Clinton, Columbus, Gilbert, Oscar, Wallace, and Lycurgus were involved. It seems that the brothers have been at variance for some time, the cause being jealousy that has existed directly between the oldest brothers, Clinton, Oscar and Lycurgus.

On Saturday morning as part of the family were at breakfast, Oscar and Lycurgus entered the dining room, locked the door after them, one putting the key in his pocket. Then one of them took a seat near the door, the other off from the table. Oscar, addressing himself to Clinton, said that they had nothing against him and did not want him to interfere in what they were about to do. Clinton jumped from his seat, but before he could speak Oscar and Lycurgus drew their revolvers and aimed at him and the rest of the family at the table and fired, wounding Clinton and their mother. The fight then became general among all the brothers, lasting some minutes. All were severely wounded except Wallace. By this time some of the beligerents had gotten outside the house.

Lycurgus and Oscar started to run. Columbus drew a revolver and fired at the murderous brothers without effect, the distance being too great. Gilbert who was standing near ran into the house and brought a rifle, fired at Oscar at long range, wounding him in the leg. He was captured by Columbus and Gilbert and held until the arrival of neighbors. He was taken to Berryville and lodged in jail.

Clinton died after lingering a couple of hours in intense agony. The mother is in a critical condition. A post mortem examination of the body of Clinton was held by Drs. Somerville, Miller and Wilson. Internal hemorrhage was found to be the cause of death, the ball entering above the right hip bone and lodging in the left knee. A coroner's inquest was held, and a verdict rendered that "Clinton Little came to his death by a pistol shot, fired premeditatedly by his brother Lycurgus." The examination will take place at Berryville, Monday. The excitement is great in Clarke county against the brothers Oscar and Lycurgus.

New Pension Law.
UNDER an act of Congress approved March 3, 1873, widows of officers who were killed, or died of disease contracted in the service, are now entitled to \$2.00 per month for each of their children.

The guardian of a minor child of a soldier who heretofore only received \$8.00 per month pension is now entitled to \$10.00 per month.

Soldiers who receive invalid pensions can now have their pensions increased to any sum or rate between \$5.00 and \$15.00 per month.

Soldiers who have lost their discharges can now obtain duplicate.

Fathers and mothers who lost sons in the service upon whom they were dependent for support, can also obtain pensions.
