Yellow Fever.

A letter from Memphis, dated the 7th inst., says, the "ravages of the fever in this city are deplorable. It is spreading with alarming rapidity, and the deaths have become so numerous that the people have more than they can do to decently bury the dead. Yesterday several dead bodies lay for many hours unattended to from the inability to obtain coffins. Among the more ignorant class much inhumanity is reported. There is a great want of attention to the sick, owing to the lack of nurses. The city authorities have proved unequal to the emergency, although the mayor, aided by a few citizens, has labored considerably to reduce the suffering. An effect will be made to increase the membership of the Howard association, a more thorough examination of the infected districts will be attempted, and efforts will be made to supply medical attendance and nurses where they are most needed. Nineteen nurses came from New Orleans yesterday, and more are on the way. Twenty thousand dollars have been subscribed by the citizens, to be used for sanitary purposes, and contributions are flowing in from all quarters. The mortality yesterday was the greatest since the fever appeared. All that are able are leaving the city, and a feeling prevails that the worst is not yet reached. The malady is the true yellow fever of the most malignant type, and those upon whom it becomes firmly fastened rarely recover. Persons who are familiar with the disease express fears for the future, and consider the situation decidedly unfavorable for checking the plague. There is no present prospect of frost, which has been earnestly hoped for."

A \$130 Fool.

A drover named Lawrence John, from West Chester, was accosted by a stranger at Thirty-first and Chestnut streets on Monday night, who asked him to drink. He declined this, but acceded to a request to walk to Thirty-third street to look after some baggage. They had met a man who said he had sent the baggage to the depot, and asked the stranger to pay \$150, which was owing him. 'The drover's newly-made friend had but a \$20 note and some gold coin, as he represented, in his pocket-book, and he asked the drover for \$130 until he got back to the dopot, where he would meet his wife and repay it. The drover refused the gold, saying he would wait until his friend met his wife, and so handed over the \$130. The friend then gave the drover an umbrella and requested him to go to the depot and show it to his wife, who would recognize it and pay him the money. In the mean time he would take a drink with the man to whom he paid the money and follow in a few minutes. The drover went to the depot, but he met neither man nor wife, and has but the umbrella for his \$130.

A Comical Sight.

The Logansport [Ind.] Star relates and vouches for the truth of the following recent occurrance in Cass county, in that state: "For some days past the weather had been dry, and pends on the prairie failed in water. The turtles and frogs that had been living in the vicinity of one of these stood it for a day or two, but it finally became too dry for the frogs, and they decided to migrate. The nearest ond that contained water was three miles distant, and to this the turtles and frogs started in solemn procession, the turtles in advance, sagaciously piloting the way, and the frogs bringing up the rear, with their deep bass and shrill tenor cries : "Go it !" "Go it !" "Water !" "Water !" The procession stretched out over the prairie a quarter of a mile long, and steadily marched to the goal, when such a rolicking seene as ensued can be better imagined the de-

An Officer Murdered.

On the 6th inst., at Paris, Ky., W. A. Burton, was murdered by Edward and Matt Current. The Currents and Henry Clay, created a disturbance in a saloon, when Burton entered and endeavored to quiet them. Edward Current shot at him several times with a revolver, two of the shots taking effect in his breast, Matt Current then seized Burton, and shot him through the head. Burton fell to the ground, and was set upon by the Current brothers, who beat him on the head with the butts of their pistols, fracturing his skull, beating his nose to a jelly, and cutting his face horribly. Marshal Miller, acrested both Currents and placed them in jail. These is great excitement over the affair. Lynching is talked of, as the Currents have frequently been troublesome before, and Burton was well liked, and in the discharge of his duty.

A boy eight years old, son of Captain Hood, residing a few miles from Oil City, was carrying a butcher's steel, used for sharpening knives, when he tumbled and fell. The steel entered the boy's chest from above and behind the collar-bone, passing diagonally downward toward the right side, a distance of five and a half inches, traversing completely the cavity of the chest, and impaling the lad as if on a spit. It passed between the vital organs and the net-work of the blood-vessels without cutting any of them, and in three days the boy was past all danger from the effects of this singularly dangerous perforation.


