The Temperance men of York county have been making lively times for the rumsellers. At the late May term of Court, there were over thirty true bills found against different persons for selling liquor without license, for selling on Sunday, and for selling to minors and drunken persons Sentences ranging from \$50 to \$10 and costs, and imprisonment in some extreme cases, were imposed on the parties tried. York county gave a majority in favor of license at the late election, and the people don't mean to have law abused and disregarded. Judge Fisher refused to license a number of houses petitioned for, against which remonstrances were presented. The rumsellers have little to expect at the hands of the Hon. R. J. Fisher.

Sale of Roads,-The Oxford Press says, "The third triennial sale of the public roads in Fulton township, Lancaster county was held on the 20th inst. The bidding was quite spirited, and nearly all the sections were disposed of at a considerable reduction on the price paid three years ago. The new system, inaugurated some six years since, by the citizens of Fulton twp., has worked admirably in that township, and is in great favor with the taxpayers .-Good roads and low taxes being the result."

The above system has been practiced for years in many places, and always with satisfactorly results. It would be a good idea to try such an experiment in this vicinity, for certainly the roads could be no worse, than under the present mismanagement.

Verdict for defendant, Sponsler for plff. Barnett for dft.

Rachel E. Campbell vs. John Freeland. This was an action of ejectment brought for the recovery of a house and lot situated on second street in the borough of Newport. It appears that it was the intention of the parties during the lifetime of the husband of the plaintiff in this suit to convey the title to defendant, but the title papers were irregularly drawn, and not acknowledged according to law. Verdict for plaintiff, McIntire for plff. Sponsler

Jonas Long vs. David Boal. This action was brought to recover damages from defendant by reason of his cutting and taking away some timber from lands claimed by plaintiff. Defendant alleged title to the land to be in himself. Verdict for defendant, Potter and Barnett for phif. McIntire

and Sponsier for dft. Edward Miller vs. S. D. Simonton. This was an action of Covenant, founded upon

a note. Plaintiff took a non-suit. McIn-

J. Riley Patterson vs. John Showers.— Action of Ejectment. The record as to when a tract of land in dispute was returned, and accepted as seated land, was not complete, and the Court directed a juror to withdraw, and the case goes over to next term. Barnett for plff.; McIntire for defendant.

The heirs of John Huggins deceased vs. Isaac Meck, guardian. This action was brought for the recovery of damages. It appears that John Huggins died in possession of several properties situated in the borough of Liverpool, which came into the hands of the guardian of his heirs. The buildings were all destroyed by fire, when it was discovered that there was but a very small amount of insurance on them, and the heirs claimed that he was negligent in not having them insured, and hence claimed damages. Verdict for defendant, Barnett and McIntire for plaintiff, Sponsler and Graham for dft.

QUARTER SESSIONS.
