Fashions Now and Then.

It is an interesting fact and true to a great extent that the style of dress and ornaments of the Hebrew ladies of the present day—and in fact the prevailing toilet of all ladies—is much the same as during the time of Solomon.

The Scriptures narrate a great many things about the style of dress worn in the time of Solomon, and in the law of Moses several directions are given concerning garments worn by the Israelites.

The tunica worn by the ladies in the time of Solomon was much like the polonaise of to-day, and the belt with fancy clasps now worn are about the same as the leather girdles and silver buckles worn of old.

Veils were worn, and sandals were made of blue and violet colored leather, with fancy latches. Solomon, as is related, said to Shulamite, "How beautiful are thy feet with shoes, O prince's daughter!"

Strawberry-Pudding Sauce.

Take small fruit or bruised fruit, or any that is left from the table, or any that will not keep well until you wish to use it, place in a closely-covered porcelain-lined saucepan on the stove, with barely water enough to cover the fruit, and stew gently for three minutes after it begins to boil.

To Make a Balty Horse Draw.
