New Pension Law. UNDER an act of Congress approved March 3, died of disease contracted in the service, are now entitled to \$2.00 per month for each of their chil-dren.

entitled to \$2.00 per month for each of their canderen.

The guardian of a minor child of a soldier who heretofore only received \$8.00 per month pension is now entitled to \$10. per moth.
Soldiers who receive invalid pensions can now have their pensions increased to any sum or rate between \$8. and \$18. per month.

Soldiers who have lost their discharges can now obtain daplicates.

Fathers and mothers who lost sons in the service upon whom they were dependent for support, can also obtain pensions.
