TOWN AND COUNTRY.

The Freedom Iron and Steel Company of Midlin county has appointed assignees by reason of financial embarrassments.

The Metropolitan Police Bill, for Philadelphia, has passed both branches of the State Legislature, and only needs the signature of the Governor to be a law.

BIDDING AT AUCTION.—Judge Butler lately rendered a decision in Chester County, which is of interest to those who conduct and attend auction sales. The case on trial was as follows: A suit was brought to recover \$1,545 on a note given as the purchase money of real estate. A gentleman who had purchased property at a public sale, and given his note for the money, learning afterwards that there were present at the time other bidders as "puffers," he refused to take the property. The Judge decided that if a party procure men to bid up property, and the person who buys it is deceived thereby, he cannot be held to his bid, as it is vitiated the sale and makes it void.

NOVEL LAW SUIT.—A novel suit, for services rendered, was tried before Joseph Long, Esq., at Adamsburg, on the 4th inst. The facts are as follows: Jacob Gross, Treasurer of Snyder Co., created his office, his term being expired, and having no employment on his farm during the winter months, requested Messrs. Crouse, Bolender & Shindler to "set him up" in some paying business, whereupon these gentlemen "fitted him up" in the Almanac and Patent Medicine business (verging being the principle drug in his outfit.) Mr. Gross used these parties for services rendered, and on the 4th met, B. T. Parks Esq., being convened for piff. Upon opening the trial it was discovered that the Justice's Docket was stolen, but after elaborate argument the Squire substituted a sheet of foolscap for a Docket. Witnesses were called and counsel heard upon the one side and the other. A verdict was rendered in favor of Piff. for \$15 and costs. Defendants have appealed, chosen referees and the case will be tried at Middleburg. After verdict adjourned to partake of a "big dinner," consisting of a roast turkey and an abundance of other good things, at the house of the Plaintiff. A large number of witnesses and spectators were in attendance.

Corn.—The market is strong, but there is very little demand except for prime dry lots, which sell readily at fall prices. Sales of 5 @ 6,000 bus new yellow in store and from the cars at 88 @ 91c, and 2,000 bus very choice Southern about at 92c. Oats are quiet, with sales of 2,000 bus Pennsylvania at 54c.
