PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 29.—In wheat there is a full supply, in excess of the demand, but prices exhibit no material change. 2,000 bushels Red sold at \$1.18 @ 25, and some inferior at \$1.10. White is worth \$1.30 @ 40. Rye is steady at about 91c. There is quite an active inquiry for Oats and the sales foot up about 2,500 bushels State and Western at 55 @ 56c, and 1,500 bushels Delaware, light at 59. Corn is dull, and prices are about 1 cent lower. 4,000 bushels Yellow sold at 97 @ 98c. There is an active call for Cloverseed and holders are firm. 400 bushels sold at 88 1/2 @ 85 for good and 88 3/4 for choice. Timothy is firm; small sales at \$5 @ 6 1/2 @ 25, according to quality. Flaxseed is in some demand for crushing, but is rather scarce; sales at \$2 25 @ 2 25.
