TOWN AND COUNTRY.

UNION county Court will be held next week.

It is feared by many that the great amount of rain we have had during the past week has injured the fruit prospects in this vicinity. We hope that such is not the case.

The railroad station at Thompsontown, Juniata county, containing one hundred cords of wood, took fire from the sparks of a passing locomotive one day last week, and was entirely destroyed.

If blossoms are any indication of the amount of fruit a tree will bear, Snyder county will be blessed with an abundance of Apples, Peaches, Cherries, etc., during the coming season.

A MEETING of the Republican Standing Committee of this county will be held in the Court House in this place next Tuesday. A full attendance is requested as business of importance will be transacted.

They resisted him when he drew a revolver and shot them both. Martha's death was instantaneous, and Welsh lived but an hour.

A GOOD HIT.—At the celebration of the adoption of the 15th Amendment at Louisville, Kentucky, a transparency was carried in procession the design on which conveyed a valuable hit at the opponents of the measure. It depicted the "Train of Progress," the locomotive, labelled "The 15th Amendment," drawn a train of twenty-nine cars, representing the ratifying States, and a number of jackasses harnessed to the rear car, emblematic of the States that refused to ratify, vainly trying to pull the train backward.

TO LAND OWNERS.—A supplement, to the act of 1864, directing the entry of liens for the principal and interest due the Commonwealth for lands held by virtue of location or other office titles, provides that in lieu of descriptive lists, it shall be the duty of the Surveyor General to make out and forward to the Prothonotaries of the several counties, ten dockets, to be styled "Land Lien Dockets," containing lists of all unpatented and patented lands, situate in the districts respectively, upon which there is money due the Commonwealth, and in all cases where surveys have been returned, to enter therein the amount of purchase money, interest and all fees due, and said aggregate shall remain a lien on such tract until paid, or otherwise legally discharged. We would inform the land owners of our county that we will publish the list of names and amounts, from time to time, until the whole list is published. Mr. Jerry Crouse, last week, visited the Surveyor's Office at Harrisburg, and secured the assurance from the officers of that department that these claims would not forthwith be pushed, but that ample time would be given for their adjustment—in other words, land owners of Snyder county will not be put to unnecessary trouble and expense for the present. Mr. Crouse having received the assurance that one or two years time would be given for the settlement of said liens.

UNUSUAL AFFLICTION.—The family of David Smith, of Buffalo township, are now passing through an unusually severe ordeal. At one time, there were thirteen persons lying in the house sick with typhoid fever, three of whom died. At our latest advice there were eight sick, one of whom was very low, being kept alive by stimulants. This family attended the funeral of A. W. Smith Esq. (a nephew of David Smith,) where doubtless, the seeds of the fatal disease were implanted in their systems. We believe that three members of A. W. Smith's family, and two other relatives who attended the funerals, also died of the same fever.—*Lewistown Chronicle*.
