SUICIDE.—The Huntingdon Journal says On Friday evening, the 17th inst., between six and seven o'clock, the town of Huntingdon, Pa., was thrown into a high state of excitement by a report that John Schaeffer, the proprietor of Lager beer saloon, opposite the Morris House, on the West corner of Allegheny and Third streets had committed suicide by shooting himself through the heart with a revolver. The facts of the case are these: Schaeffer was then drinking freely through the day and in the evening he procured a horse and buggy and drove out in the direction of Alexandra. A short distance beyond Smithfield, in full view of several persons, his horse pursued a very narrow gate, he drew out a revolver and shot himself, the ball entering the heart. An inquest was held eliciting the facts above stated. He leaves a wife and two small children. He appeared to be doing a brisk business.

By paying, Mr. Deane a large sum for advance sheets of this new novel, they afford an honest remuneratior to the author, and at the same time are able to present it to the American public fresh and three weeks in advance of its arrival in this country in any other form. There is no doubt that this enterprise pays for, aside from the public appreciation of fair dealing. Mr. Deane's fiction excites so ravenous an appetite in its readers that no one who gets it fresh in every Saturday will be content to wait in slower piratical publication elsewhere.
