A fire was started to burn the debris and it is supposed was communicated to the woodshed, early in the afternoon, as the house was discovered to be on fire about 4 p. m. Mr. Etinger, the tenant and his oldest son were in town hauling stone, and Mrs. Etinger was assisting one of the neighbors in preparing for a barn raising, thus leaving no one at home but small children, (the neighbor who was working in the garden having gone home) consequently, the house, with all its contents, was entirely consumed. Mr. Gast's loss is about \$1,200. No insurance. Mr. Etinger and family lose everything they had except the clothing they had on. All his tools, a large quantity of flour, in short, everything that was in the house was destroyed.—Middletown Telegraph.
