To School Directors.—The Act of April 22, 1863, requires new school boards to organize within ten days of their first meeting in June in each year. Their organization must take place, therefore, the present year, on or before the 14th of June. As it is important that the new boards should meet and organize promptly according to law, the old boards should fix a time for holding a meeting for the purpose and give due notice to the directors elect.

Upon meeting for the purpose of organization, directors should first elect a temporary president and secretary, and proceed to ascertain who are members, by having read the election returns placed in the hands of the old board by the proper election officers. Disputed points concerning claims to seats must be disposed of. Questions arising out of the votes must be settled. And when it is ascertained who are its members, the board is ready to organize permanently by electing a president, a secretary and a treasurer. Those having a right to vote under the temporary organization are the directors holding over and the persons duly notified of their election. Those entitled to vote in effecting the organization are the directors holding over and the persons found entitled to seats in the board by their election.
