"You don't say so!" responded the too confiding Mr. Walker, and the two journeyed on, happily, discussing the advantages of Bellefonte as a situation for a first class drug store. If Mr. Walker would wait a few moments he would go to his hotel and get his valise, then with pleasure accompany him to the insurance office.

About this time sharper No. 2 appeared, with gold spectacles, gold chain and an air of business, wishing that little bill settled.

"Oh, indeed," was the response of No. 1 "I saw scrape on your door and thought some one was dead."

History of Umbrellas.

At the annual gathering of the members of the Glasgow umbrella trade, the chairman gave the following bits of history in regard to the subject: "Dr. Morrison, the great missionary to China, states that there is mention made of umbrellas and parasols in books printed in China more than 1,500 years ago, and that most wonderful traveler, Layard, relates that he discovered on the ruins of Nineveh, in his relief, a representation of a king in his chariot, with an attendant holding an umbrella over his head. In India we also find the umbrella has been in use in remote ages, and principally as an insignia of royalty, its shape differing very little from those in modern use. In Barmah the princes use a very large umbrella, and it requires a separate attendant to carry it, and his position is a recognized one in the royal household. One of the titles of the king is as follows: "King of the white elephant and lord of twenty-four umbrellas." The Emperor of China who never does anything on a small scale (it can help it), has no fewer than twenty-four umbrellas carried before when goes out hunting. It is used in that country as a defense against rain as well as sun, and is principally made of a sort of glazed silk or paper beautifully painted. We find umbrellas mentioned as in use, or at least worn, in England 150 years ago. In Cambridge, we read that early in the last century umbrellas were let out on hire for so much per hour like sedan chairs. Jonas Hanway, the founder of a hospital in London, has the credit of being the first person in London that had the courage habitually to carry an umbrella. He died in 1750, and it is said that he carried an umbrella for thirty years; so the date of their introduction for general use may be said to date from 1750."
