Southern belles reign at White Sulphur Springs.
—Cape May has a new hotel called the Senate House.
—New wheat is being delivered to the mills in York county.
—Sixty one stocks of rye were raised from one grain, in the Cumberland valley.
—Land sharks is a term quite applicable to the majority of the Long Branch hotel keepers.
—A Kentucky farmer has sold two short-horn heifers for \$6500 each.
—The liberal Republican ratification meetings held in this State have all been failures.
—Lightning has been very destructive of horses this season, in the Cumberland valley.
—A couple were married at Lafayette, Ind., the other day, in a balloon, one mile above the earth; a wedding in high life.

—A heavy shock of an earthquake was felt on Long Island and in Connecticut on the morning of the 11th inst.
—A rhinoceros escaped from a menagerie in Vermont recently, and gave the farmers a free show by wandering through their meadows.
—While hoeing cotton on a plantation in North Carolina, a negro woman found a lump of gold weighing half a pound.
—A mulatto child was recently born on the plantation of Mr. Sillan, near Cyrenot, La., with but one eye, set in the middle of its forehead.
—New Orleans street railroads offer \$1,000 reward for the arrest of parties who put counterfeit nickles in the fare box.
—A California lady purchased a chicken for home consumption, and found a piece of placer gold worth \$5 in its craw.
—The washer-women of Detroit are said to be organizing a trade union to protect themselves against "Chicago cheap labor."

Some of the churches of Reading have resolved to close during the hot weather. Preachers, there, must be distant fellows, and ought to have resignations connected with their pulpits to keep them cool.
—Wisconsin is exciting itself about a little girl whose head is said to weigh seventy-eight pounds. How they manage to weigh the head without the body is not stated.
—An Illinois man lately started a steam chicken manufactory with several thousand eggs. The forcing process was carried on so vigorously that only four were hatched, the others being roasted.

—In tearing up the roof of the Court House at Edwardsville, Illinois, last week, the workmen discovered skeletons of pigeons piled up by the hundreds. A defect in the cornice enabled the pigeons to get in, but they were unable to get out again.
—It is asserted that since the close of the rebellion not less than 23,000 persons, black and white have been scourged, banished or murdered by the Ku-Klux Klans of the South. There were no Democrats among them.
—A fierce war between the Reading railroad and Adams' Express company is now raging. It is a fight as to who shall have the power to pluck the people, and therefore it does not matter which wins.
—Men competent to make the estimate say that the loss of wages by the strike of the mill workmen of Williamsport does not fall short of four thousand five hundred dollars a day—and over rather than under that.
—It seems the Mormon missionaries have not a very happy time in Denmark. The Government has ordered all teachers of that faith to be tied up and flogged, and one of the apostles has actually been so welcomed.

—As a party of boys were bathing in the river at Memphis on Friday, one of them named John Murphy, was shot dead by a man named Sturgeon, who said "the boys were bathing too near his house." The murderer escaped.
—It is stated that the receipts from admission at the Boston musical jubilee amounted to about \$430,000, and the expenses to from \$550,000 to 600,000. The loss is made up by a "guarantee fund."
—Hon. S. C. Cox was robbed of his gold watch and chain and all his money, while at Baltimore in attendance on the Democratic convention. Some of the Greeley Democratic horse thieves were evidently on hand.
—Some twenty-five persons were poisoned at New Wilmington, Lawrence county, recently, by eating ice cream. Some sort of poisonous substance got into the cream in flavoring it, and all those who partook of it suffered more or less severely, and some, it was feared, would be in danger of death.
—John Wilson, of West Vincent, Chester county, a lively youth of ninety-one summers, concluded that he was old enough to ride in a railroad car, so he took a trip on the Pickering Valley railroad—the first time in his life he ever "rode on the rail." He still lives.

The little chap took a seat at the stand, where the servant gave him some dinner.
