### THE ELECTIONS.

Republican Majorities,  
Pennsylvania 6000 OVER 30,000.

Members of Congress Gained.  
OHIO 20,000 MAJORITY,  
The House State Very Close,  
NEBRASKA ROLLS UP 5,000

On Tuesday last the Republican party did a noble work, and we have particular reason to be proud of Pennsylvania's share in that work. John P. Hartman is chosen Governor by from twenty-five to thirty thousand majority, and the whole State ticket is successful in like manner.

In the city of Philadelphia the Republican majority is about twenty thousand. We gain largely in both branches of City Councils. We elect Alexander to the Senate in the First District, in place of Decherd, Democratic, and we carry 15 of the 18 Legislative districts in the city. This insures a Republican Congressman at large, and probably carry nineteen of the Congressional districts.

### STRAIGHT AT HOME.

In 1871 McCandless, Democratic candidate for Auditor General, had 554 majority in Montgomery county. Gen. Hartman carried Montgomery county on Tuesday by twenty-one majority. This shows well for our candidate at home, and is a compliment to him which needs no comment, except it is to say that it is complete answer to all that was said derogatory of his private and official character.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9, 12:30 p.m.—Hartman's majority in the State is over 30,000. We gain Berry, Ross, Baker, Cessna, Taylor, Richmond and Moore, and probably lose Shoemaker for Congress. We have the Senate—sixteen to sixteen, and eighteen to fifteen, is Machay is elected in the Chelten district. The House stands probably sixty to forty. The Republicans have also five majority in the Constitutional Convention, as they carry all four Senatorial districts here. Resign. Emmet.

### GENERAL ELECTION IN '72. WHERE ARE THE LIBERALS?

Below will be found the official returns of the general election held on the 8th inst., as reported by the Return Judges. It will be seen that Snyder county rolls up the handsome majority of 534 for the gallant Hartraum and elects the whole Republican county ticket by handsome majorities.

Col. E. Bryant, Deputy Collector of Customs, was very seriously harassed by the "sping nigh," who had been appointed special Deputy Sheriff. The very worst class of the white Democratic element were sworn in as special Deputy Sheriffs.

A great outrage upon the rights of citizens has been perpetrated. The polls were surrounded by a large body of police armed with muskets; the "Sabre Club" patrolled the street mounted. This morning the roads leading to the city were picketed, and voters from the county were driven back and not allowed to come into the city to vote. Only four voting places were provided for the 8,000 voters in the country, and these all in one building.
