Republican Majorities.

PENNSYLVANIA GOES OVER 30,000.

Members of Congress Gained.

OHIO 23,000 MAJORITY.

The House State Very Close.

NEBRASKA ROLLS UP 8,000.

On Tuesday last the Republican party did a noble work, and we have particular reason to be proud of Pennsylvania's share in that work. John F. Hartman is chosen Governor by a majority of twenty-five thousand majority, and the whole State ticket is successful in like manner.

In the city of Philadelphia the Republican majority is about twenty thousand. We gain largely in both branches of City Councils. We elect Alexander to the Senate in the First District, in place of Dechert, Democrat, and we carry 15 of the 18 Legislative Districts in the city. This insures a Republican Congress at large, and probably carry nineteen of the Congressional districts.

Heretofore at Home.

In 1871 M. Candless, Democratic candidate for Auditor General, had 754 majority in Montgomery county. Gen. Hartman carried Montgomery county on Tuesday by twenty one majority. This shows well for our candidate at home, and is a compliment to him which needs no comment, except it is to say that it is a complete answer to all that was said derogatory of his private and official character.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 9, 12:30 p. m.—Hartman's majority in the State is over 30,000. We gain Berry, Ross, Baker, Cassin, Taylor, Richardson and Moore, and probably Isaac Shoemaker for Congress. We have the Senate sure—seventeen to sixteen, and eighteen to fifteen, in Maclay is elected in the Clinton district. The House stands probably sixty to forty. The Republicans have also five majority in the Constitutional Convention, as they carry all four Senatorial districts here.

GENERAL ELECTION 1872.

Where are the Liberals?

Below will be found the official returns of the general election held on the 8th inst., as reported by the Return Judges. It will be seen that Snyder county rolls up the handsome majority of 534 for the gallant Hartman and elects the whole Republican county ticket by handsome majority.

Ohio.

The reports from Ohio are favorable to the Republicans, who claimed to have carried the State by fifteen thousand majority. They also carry a majority of the Congressional districts.

New Jersey.

The Newark Charter election resulted in over 2,000 Republican majority, a gain of nearly 1,000 over last year's charter elections, and more than 3,000 over Governor Parker's majority last November. The Republican carry 13 of 15 wards, and elect 12 aldermen. The new Council will stand 20 Republicans to 10 Democrats.

Nebraska.

The elections passed off quietly, and a full vote was polled. The Republican State Congressional ticket was elected by 5,600 majority. The Douglas county, considered the Liberal stronghold, gives a Republican majority of 100.

District of Columbia.

Gen. N. P. Chipman, Republican, the present delegate in Congress, is elected by 5,636 majority, and the Republicans elected nineteen out of twenty-two delegates to the Legislative Assembly. Chipman's majority shows a Republican gain of 1,520 over the last vote.

Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 10.—Returns received up to noon to-day are more favorable for the Republican State ticket. The Republicans claim 600 majority on the entire State ticket.

Connecticut.

HARTFORD, Oct. 8.—One hundred and twenty of the one hundred and sixty-eight towns in this State have been heard from. Fifty-eight elect the entire Republican ticket and in twenty-four of these the offices are divided between the two parties.
