AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—Pursuant to notice the Executive Committee of the Snyder County Agricultural Society met at the office of T. J. Smith, in the Borough of Middlebury, on Saturday, May 8, 1873.

After taking the chair, the President presented a communication from the "Driving Park Association" of Selinsgrove, offering to furnish their ground with necessary buildings free of all expense to the Society for the holding of the next fair. Provided the Agricultural Society pay them the one-half of the net profits. The communication was received and on motion laid on the table.

On motion, the Treasurer was ordered to notify all parties owing the Society to pay in sixty days, and if there be no compliance to said notice, to institute legal proceedings for the securing of the same.

The action of the Society at its annual meeting in regard to the selection of a permanent place for the holding of its annual Fairs, was then brought to the attention of the committee, and a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. J. K. Davis, George Morris, H. J. Gitter, Allen Schaefer and T. J. Smith appointed to carry out the spirit of said resolution and make report at the next meeting of the Executive Committee. Their report is to be binding must however be ratified by a majority of said executive committee.

On motion of J. K. Davis, Esq., Thomas J. Smith, Allen Schaefer and George Morris were appointed to revise the premium list, and make report at next meeting.
