FARMER'S BOYS.—There are ten of thousands of farmer's boys throughout the country who are dissatisfied with the life they lead. They go about their daily work as if it was so much drudgery forced upon them. They have no love for the farm, no taste for the labor which it demands. Their hearts are not in their work. They stick to it through necessity, and spend half their days in idle dreams over some happy combination of circumstances that will lead them to seek their fortune in some populous city. They have read of some poor friendless lad who shouldered his bundle and turned his face toward some great city, found friends there that gave him employment and helped him up the ladder of fame and wealth, and they think that his changes would be theirs if they had but the courage to face the music as he did. They forget that where one country boy bettered his condition by city experience a thousand made theirs worse than before. The rare exceptions of success find a place on record, but the countless failures that go to make up the rule are passed by unnoticed. City life is ruin and death to thousands who enter it. Its victims come largely from the country districts. Foolish young men, who were reared on farms, had good homes and kind friends, are to be found struggling to obtain a living in some obscure place where the sunshine never enters. Temptations surround them; some may stand, but the majority fall, and go to swell the fearful current of vice that sweeps through our populous cities. A word of advice to our farmer's boys: If you are tired of farm life, and have some well defined idea of what you can do in a great city, go if you feel that you have the requisite courage and resolution to face the temptations that will beset you. If you are sick of the farm, and don't know what you would do in the city, but feel that in the great crowds of business men that would meet something would "turn up" to help you, stay just where you are! abandon your idle dreams! get over your farm sickness, and go to work good in earnest. Take an interest in the farm. If you find it too small, buy more land; make it large enough to satisfy your energies, or if too large cut it down until it suits. The moment you drop your city fancies that moment you become another man. You will stop complaining, labor will be light on your shoulders, the old farm will look attractive for the first time since early boyhood, and you have made the first step toward an honorable career in the most useful and honorable professions.
