EXCELLENT CUSTARD PIE.—Take one quart of milk, five eggs; take out the whites of the eggs; beat the yolks add half a cup of sugar; a little salt; flavor to suit the taste; fill the pie and bake. While the pies are baking, beat the whites of the eggs to a froth adding one spoonful of fine white sugar; beat again, and when the pie is done baking; spread the frosting over the tops of the pie; set in the oven to brown and you have a pie that will satisfy the appetite of the most fastidious.

BOILED BREAD Pudding.—Crumb your stale bread in a pudding pan and cover with sweet milk, and set by the stove to warm and soften. Then to every quart of the mixture add two well beaten eggs, a half cup of sugar, and a handful of raisins or sweet dried fruit of any kind. Do not have your pudding full, as it needs some room to rise. Put the cover on tightly, set in boiling water, and do not allow it to stop boiling till done. If you try that you will never make a baked pudding again. Serve with cream.

A correspondent of the Scientific American says: "The best remedy for bleeding at the nose, as given by Dr. Gleason in one of his lectures, is a vigorous motion of the jaws as if in the act of mastication. In the case of a child, a wad of paper should be placed in its mouth and the child instructed to chew it hard. Of course an adult does not need the paper. It is the motion of the jaws that stops the flow of blood. This remedy is very simple that many will feel inclined to laugh at it, but it has never been known to fail in a single instance, even in very severe cases.
