To the Voters and Tax Payers of Snyder County.

The time for the election of township and borough officers being near at hand, I deem it my duty again to call your attention to the importance of electing school directors for the coming year. Where the directors take an interest in education, the schools are improving rapidly; and where they take little or no interest, some of the schools are so poor that they might as well be closed as continued the way they are. In view of these facts it is your solemn duty to see that none but the most suitable men be elected. They should be men of undoubted integrity and honesty; men in whom you can place the utmost confidence. They should, if possible, be men of education, of good judgment, of progressive views, and of intelligence.

The amount of money annually expended for school purposes, and the proper education of the children, are things too important to be entrusted to persons without regard to suitable qualifications. In employing teachers as well as in erecting and furnishing school houses, good judgment is required. If the directors look only to cheapness in their expenditures, the tax-payers will, when it is too late, see the mistake. Economy should be used in public affairs just the same as in private ones; but the cheapest thing is not to be borne in mind, are not always the best; on the contrary, they are more frequently the poorest as well as dearest. Nor are the more expensive things always to be preferred to others, for their cost may exceed their value.—Many of the school houses of our county show that the money expended in their erection was not expended to improve them. But it is possible; and, consequently, the matter had been entrusted to persons lacking the necessary qualifications for such work.

The schools of our county are yet far from what they should be, and can be made. I believe that I am making every effort to improve them. But can you very little without the assistance of a director. If, instead of carrying suggestions into execution, they do nothing at all, or what is still worse, they oppose them, your children will be educated, and to choose the most suitable men you can find.
