The Fall Outlook.

Last winter, all through the spring and in the early summer days, when Congress was bringing its sessions to a close, the opposition organs and newspapers were prating glibly of the great political reaction the following October and November would bring to the country.

In the South every carpet bagger and sealawag would be sent back to the obscurity from which he had emerged to plunder and oppress a down-trodden nation; and in the East a discontented people, eagerly pointing for change and reform, would drive from power the champions and agents of monopoly and legislative jobbery and corruption.

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That back pay grab seems to have been fatal to nearly every Congressman who voted for it either party. The places that once knew them shall know them no more forever.

Mr. JUSTUS TEMPLE, the Democratic candidate for Auditor General, was never heard of before his nomination outside his own district, and he has no record except that which he kept when prothonotary of Greene county. The idea that such a man would work a reformation in the affairs of the office and hold the State Treasurer in check is too preposterous to be entertained.

The March Chumek Coal Gazette is of opinion that "Mr. Latta, the Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor, is not much of a friend of the farmers. While he was a member of the Legislature he introduced a bill to tax all sheep over two months old at ten cents per head. It is not likely many farmers will support a man whose only public act was an attempt to impose an unjust tax upon them.

GENERAL McCANDLESS is called General because, while the fighting was going on in the Wilderness and almost in the light of burning Chambersburg, he wrote to the Secretary of War declaring that no man could honorably serve in the Union army, and declining a Brigadier Generalship, which was tendered him. Therefore, soldiers, you are asked to vote for General William M. Candless. After this effort of self-sacrificed devotion to rebellion, Gen. McCandless rushed bravely into the whisky business in Philadelphia. His legitimate profits were not sufficient for his wants, and his distillery was accordingly seized by the government officials for illicit distillation.

The Germantown Telegraph says: It will doubtless be agreeable news to many friends in this section to learn that General Langhorne Wister, who distinguished himself in the war for the Union and was wounded at the battle of Gettysburg, a son of William Wister, Esq., of Germantown, has been nominated by the Republicans for Congress in the Seventeenth district, composed of the counties of Franklin, Huntingdon, Juniata, Perry, Snyder and Fulton. This district is a fair canvass, is Republican by nearly a thousand majority, though it is now represented by Mr. Spear, a Democrat, and can be easily carried by a united effort in the several counties; and this we are assured will be made, as the entire district is harmonious and exhibits a laudable enthusiasm on the Congressional nomination.

We desire to say to our contemporaries in the district that the distinction could have been conferred on no one more worthy of it. Although General Wister is a sound as well as a profound Republican, he is not a politician in any accepted sense of the word.
