A Strange Story.

An extraordinary and interesting case, marvellous as a tale of fiction, has lately come to light in New York city. An old miser named Lutter Bryant, reputed very rich, and who lived in a room in the rear of a large tenement house, was arrested and locked up in the Tombs a short time ago, charged with the fraudulent purchase of postage stamps. The old miser had a stand against the iron railing of the Old Dutch Church, corner of Fulton and William streets, for the ostensible purpose of dealing in old coins, &c., but his principal business was to buy postage stamps at about half-price from messenger boys who stole them from their firms. The old miser had been engaged in this business for four years, and had fifty boys supplying him with stamps and made a very good thing out of it. The case became so great that several merchants were led to suspect that something was wrong, and set detectives on the watch, who soon unearched old Bryant. He was accordingly arrested and locked up. And now comes the curious part of the story. During Bryant's imprisonment the premises which he had occupied and the door to which was secured by double padlocks, remained apparently undisturbed until a week or two ago, when it was observed that the locks had been broken off and the door was ajar, and on inspection was found to have been ransacked of everything. On receiving this intelligence Bryant almost fainted, and, on fully comprehending the intelligence, acted like a lunatic. He told the officer that the room contained money and valuables to the amount of nearly \$100,000, and that he was reduced to beggary by the robbery. Superintendent Walling was notified, and at his request District Attorney Phelps discharged Bryant from prison on his own recognizance, so as to enable him to consult with and aid the Police authorities in search for the stolen property. Bryant visited his room, and after carefully inspecting the premises, furnished Superintendent Walling with the following list of money and property claimed by him to have been stolen: \$70,000 in United States gold coin in 820 pieces, each piece has a small hole punched in the head of the Goddess of Liberty; \$12,000 in legal tender notes; \$1,000 in mutilated currency; a gold watch, the movement of which was manufactured by Appleton & Tracy, and which is marked M. D. in old English characters, and valued at \$500; the case weighs seventy-three penny weights, and is marked No. 803; a gold chain, composed of solid oblong bars, partly engraved, and weighing 100 penny weights; a diamond and amethyst ring; a pair of amethyst sleeve buttons marked M. D., a pair of gold eye glasses, twelve silver tablespoons, twelve silver teaspoons, a set of mustard, salt, and sugar spoons, all marked M. D., and a pearl album handsomely engraved. A circular describing this property, and offering a reward of \$5,000 for its recovery, has been issued, and distributed all over the country.

Turning Points of Physical Life.

From 25 to 35 is the true time for the enjoyment of a man's best powers, when physical vigor is at its highest. During the last half of this decade a man should be assiduous to construct a system of philosophy, by which to rule his life, and to contract a chain of habits intelligently; so that they should not sit too tightly upon him, and yet cautiously, so that he should neither be their slave, nor too easily cast them aside. The exact proportion of physical and intellectual strength should be gauged, and the constitutional weakness, or, in other words, the disease toward which a tendency exist, should be ascertained.

Preserve, if possible, the absolute necessity for exercise, and have your place of business two or three miles away, over which let nothing tempt you to an omnibus or carriage, save rain. The day on which a medical man gives up riding to see his country patients, or the use of his own legs to see his patients in town, and takes to a close brougham, fixes the date when sedentary diseases are set up—while if to utilize his leisure, he reads as he drives, his eyesight becomes seriously affected. From 35 to 45 a man should arrange with his food, and avoid hypochondria. He cannot, it is true, change his diathesis; but he can manage it. The habitual character of food, no less than its quality, begins to tell whether it charges the system with fat, muscle, snow, fiber, or watery particles. From 45 to 55 the recuperative powers should be encouraged and developed.

There is nothing like work to keep an old horse sound. Sporting dogs should be thin, but closely will set in. Anxiety ought to be staved off, hope encouraged, and sulky cars avoided. If a grief exists it should not be brooded over, but talked up with a friend, gauged, estimated in its worst, and dismissed to absorb itself. If a man at this time is much occupied out doors, and lives wholesomely and temperately, he is pretty sure to be clear of sedentary diseases. Rheumatism, coughs, and inflammatory diseases, arising from exposure to wet or cold, a man of 45 will have to contend with, but his blood will be in a good condition for the struggle. Moderate exposure to hardships of this kind never harmed man yet—*Full Moll Gazette.*

BALDY HORSES.—The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, puts forth a set of rules for the treatment of baldy horses.

1. Fat the horse upon the neck; examine the harness carefully, first on one side and then on the other, speaking encouragingly while doing so; then jump into the wagon and give the word go; generally he will obey.
2. A teamster in Maine says he can start the worst baldy horse by taking him out of the shafts and making him go round in a circle till he is giddy. If the first dance of this sort doesn't cure him, the second will.
3. To cure a baldy horse, simply place your hand over the horse's nose and shut off his wind until he wants to go.
4. The brain of a horse seems to entertain but one idea at a time; therefore, continued whipping only confirms his stubborn resolve. If you can, by any means, give him a new subject to think of, you will generally have no trouble in starting him. A simple remedy is to take a couple of turns of stonewool around the forehead, just below the knee, tight enough for the horse to feel, and tie in a bow knot. At the first check he will generally go dancing off, and after going a short distance you can get out and remove the string, to prevent injury to the tendon in your further drive.
5. Take the tail of the horse between the hind legs, and tie it by a cord to the saddle girth.
6. Tie a string around the horse's ear, close to his head.
