The United States Senate has passed the law reducing the President's Salary to \$25,000, the amount paid before Grant's second term. The vote on the passage of the act was 29 ayes against 19 nays.

The Republicans of New Hampshire have 33 majority in the House and 9 of the 12 Senators. This great gain is not very telling in favor of the democrats this investigation year. Last year the democrats had a majority in the Senate and the Republicans only 9 majority in the house.

The Democrats are doing some tall chalking over the disgrace of Belknap, and think they have a dead sure thing of the next Presidency, but we guess they are counting their chickens before they are hatched. As much as the people abhor corruption, they would infinitely rather put up with a little of it than so infernal much treason.—*Huntington Globe*.

On the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Pardons, Gov. Hartman, on the 15th inst., signed the pardon of the three Commissioners of Schuylkill county who were recently convicted of malfeasance in office. The pardon was advocated by ex-Senator Randall, Representative Losh and the entire delegation from Schuylkill county in the Legislature.

The Reading Eagle (Democrat) is wrathful over the result of the New Hampshire election, and gives vent to its pent up rage in this way:

The Democratic majority in Congress is responsible for the defeat in New Hampshire, and let the people hold them responsible for it. Democrats in Congress, stop your blundering, go to work, show that you mean business, stop your bumptious speeches, show up the thieves, cut down expenses, give the people a good financial policy, and with good candidates you can still win.

Hiester Clymer, in a fit of rhetorical enthusiasm, declared that the misdeemeanor of his friend Bellamy has "no parallel in our history, or in any other country." What a poor memory Hiester has! The treachery and treason of Coble, Floyd, Tongue, Davis, and the other leaders of Mr. Clymer's party, which are to Bellamy's crimes as a mountain to a mole hill, have entirely escaped his mind. Thus is shameful ignorance, Hiester, or disgraceful meanness, which we are sorry to see in a gentleman representing so intelligent and truthful a people as the Berkshires.—*Lebanon Courier*.

Poverty and Labor Corps—Probably in no year since the establishment of this Republic has there been more pinching want, suffering starvation, business embarrassment and financial depression that in the year just closed. And yet the crops have been more abundant than before, and nature more prolific in providing for the physical wants of man. Man and government and not nature are to blame that there is so much want and trouble abroad in the land. The agricultural reports of November and December say that the November returns indicate that the corn crop of 1873 was one of the largest ever grown in this country, probably equaling the very large crops of 1870 and 1872. It is at least a fourth greater than the crop of 1869 reported in the last census. Every section in the Union reports and increase.

A Bold Robbery.

NEW YORK, March 15.—This evening about 8 o'clock, two men entered the jewelry store of Louis Bellows, No. 573 Hicks street Brooklyn, and asked to look at a clock. When Mr. Bellows' back was turned one of the men seized Mrs. Bellows by the wrist, and holding a revolver to her head told her to be quiet. She screamed, and Mr. Bellows, turning and seeing how matters were, went to rescue his wife, when he was knocked senseless with a sling shot. One of the men seized a tray of valuable rings and made off with it and was followed by the other. Two other associates of the daring robbers stood in the doorway of the store, with drawn pistols in their hands, to assist their companions if necessary. All the parties escaped and no arrests have yet been made by the police.

A Man Gagged and Robbed in Broad Daylight.

About eight o'clock this morning four men went into the taverne of M. Terry, No. 933 Catharine street, and called for drinks. While the proprietor was getting them ready the men walked into a back room and told him to bring their drinks to them. Suspecting nothing wrong, he did so and while putting the glasses on a table, one of the men struck him a blow that felled him to the floor, then they stuffed a pillow-case in his mouth, blindfolded him and tied him to a chair. This done they proceeded to ransack the house, and after securing \$100 in cash and all the valuables, they made good their escape. Terry remained tied in his chair until a customer happened to drop in and release him. He says he does not know who the men are, but can recognize them, and from the description given, the police are confident they will have no difficulty in capturing the entire party.—*Phila. Telegraph*, March 19.
