

Our Next State Treasurer.

Colonel William B. Hart, the courts and efficient cashier of the State Treasury, is prominently named in connection with the Republican nomination of State Treasurer, to succeed Hon. Henry Rawle. The hearty and general approval with which his name is received throughout the whole State is a just tribute to a brave soldier and worthy official, whose career in the army was as brilliant as his services as a State officer have been marked by a faithful regard for the public interests. Col. Hart entered the army in 1831 as a private soldier and served with great gallantry in the East and West, participating in all the battles in which his command was engaged. While still a Sergeant, his manly qualities and soldierly bearing, attracted the attention of General Hartman who recommended him in a highly flattering manner to Gen. Edwin M. Stanton, Secretary of War, for appointment as Assistant Adjutant General, with the rank of Captain, and to show his appreciation of his merits requested the War Department to assign Captain Hart to his own brigade. Upon this recommendation he was immediately appointed and served with General Hartman to the close of the war. In 1863 Colonel Hart was appointed to a clerkship in the State Treasury, and in 1870 was promoted to the responsible and important position of cashier, where his intelligence and ability as a accountant and familiarity with the finances of the State have made him an invaluable officer, and the standard authority to whom all the officers of the Commonwealth turn for counsel when legislation in the interests of the State Treasury is needed.

Col. Hart's intimate and thorough knowledge of the tax laws and of the whole machinery of our tax system is of inestimable value to our citizens, and if elected State Treasurer cannot but prove of incalculable benefit to the Commonwealth. His promotion by election to the Treasury would be a fitting testimony to our people of his value and worth, and a practical illustration of their belief in a civil service.

Officers with his capacity and integrity are rarely imported into the public service, and when found there the people should see to it that they are retained.

Col. Hart's position at Harrisburg has necessarily given him a large acquaintance and made him hosts of friends, and the generous response made to the mention of his name in connection with the office of Treasurer is an index of the enthusiasm with which he will be supported for nomination and election.—Norristown Herald.

The Legislature has been in session two weeks, and not a single bill has yet passed the House finally.
