The inauguration of Hayes as President meets with universal approval all over the United States. Mr. Hayes arrived in Washington on Friday where he had a hearty welcome, and all along the route from his home in Ohio to Washington he was received with great demonstrations—republicans and democrats, rejoicing that the presidential question has been settled with such universal satisfaction. We have no particulars of the inaugural ceremonies.

President Hayes was sworn into office at the White House on Saturday evening by Chief Justice Waite. Nobody but President Grant and Secretary Fish were present.

From the latest news we have from Washington it is announced that Senator Sherman, Carl Schurz, Senator K. Y. (Dem.), and Representatives McCrary and Foss have been offered places in Hayes's cabinet.

Wonderfully well 114 153 Republicans press preserved its dignity through this severe trial, but there is no wisdom in assuming any number of any party for an election in regard to the action of the Electoral Tribunal.

The Governor of Kentucky, appointed Hon. James P. Stewart of Allegheny county, State of Ohio, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Henry W. Williams. The Senate confirmed this appointment at its session on Monday afternoon.

Mr. Stenger objected to the vote of Hogg, one of the Pa. electors who was elected to supply the vacancy of Daniel J. Morrill, a U. S. Centennial Commissioner. Pennsylvania gave Hayes 18,000 majority, but Mr. Stenger wanted to invalidate him out of vote.

The Cincinnati Enquirer, the Democratic organ of Ohio, says: "Throughout all this trying hour since and before the election, Governor Hayes has done nothing to forfeit the respect of his fellow citizens." Equally important is the truth that Governor Hayes is absolutely untrammelled by pledges to politicians; he never plotted for the place he is soon to fill. He is a man of independent fortune, superb health, excellent habits, even temper, and deliberate judgment. Without renewing the contract suggested by such remarkable qualities, between himself and Mr. Tilden, these suspicious considerations should moderate the mortification of those who have lost the golden prize.

One of the subjects frequently discussed in connection with the settlement of the Presidential question is the policy that will probably be adopted in reference to the Southern States. While no one has been authorized to speak authoritatively for Governor Hayes in connection with the details of administration, his own public utterances and the statements of his immediate friends justify the belief that he is animated by an earnest desire to annihilate sectional animosities and to favor all just and appropriate measures for promoting the prosperity of the people of the South. Such action would doubtless be warmly approved by the mass of the citizens of the North, irrespective of party. The conviction that all portions of the Union are now welded together forever makes the national management of any section a matter for general rejoicing, and when higher motives are added self-interest incites a universal desire for the prosperity of every section of the Republic.—Press

Tilden's future course is foreshadowed in a special Washington dispatch to the Baltimore American. He is said to be averse to the policy of delay, but as soon as Hayes is inaugurated he will institute proceedings in quo warrantu or in scire facias, by citing Hayes to show cause why he should not vacate the Presidential office for the purpose of getting before the full Bench of Supreme Court the question as to whether the Tribunal, in excluding evidence, construed the Electoral Bill in accordance with its true meaning and with the Constitution. This will have the effect of an appeal from the Tribunal to the Supreme Court in full bench, and will compel the Court to go on record as sustaining or reversing the action of the Tribunal.—The first test will come on the question of jurisdiction, if jurisdiction is affirmed the next test will come on the question as to whether the Tribunal properly discharged its duties under the law; if this be entertained by the Court the third and final test will come on the question as to whether evidence excluded by the Tribunal shall be admitted in order to Hayes answer to the citation to show cause why he should not vacate the Presidential office. This Mr. Tilden clearly has the right to do, and a Republican need have any fear of the result.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The electoral commission met at eleven o'clock this morning pursuant to adjournment. Commissioners Clifford, Miller, Strong, Field, Bradley, Morton, Foulsham, Kerman, Payne and Abbott were present. After fixing the amount of compensation to be paid to officers and other employees and extending until March 31 the time heretofore allowed for the filing of opinions by members, the commission, at 11:30 adjourned sine die.

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ATTACK BY THIEVES.—A correspondent writing from Louisiana says: Louisiana, which has generally felt the effects of its own misfortune, has been the theatre of a robbery which has excited the sympathy of the whole country. The robbery was committed on the night of the 1st inst. at the residence of a gentleman, who was returning from a party given at the residence of a friend. The robbery was committed by a party of five or six men, who entered the residence by a back door, and proceeded to the room where the gentleman was sleeping. They bound him with cords, and then proceeded to rob him of his money and jewelry. The robbery was discovered by a neighbor, who called to the aid of the police. The thieves fled, and the gentleman was taken to the hospital, where he is recovering from his wounds.

The Democrats who are now howling under the Electoral Commission bill forget what passed in the vote on the bill in the two House's. The vote was 154 Democrats and 51 Republicans for the measure, and 15 Democrats and 83 Republicans against it. Had the Commission decided the other way, what a noble and patriotic set of men they would have been in the eyes of the Democracy! WASHINGTON, March 2.—The last cabinet session under President Grant's administration was held today. Secretary Morrill, who still remained in his room, being the only member of the cabinet who was absent. The cabinet adjourned at two o'clock in the afternoon, and cabinet officers say it was not characterized by any business of importance. The session was devoted to the very pleasant relation that had existed between the President and his cabinet.
