THE LAW OF PUBLIC SALES.—In a sale by auction there are three parties, namely: the owner of the property to be sold, the auctioneer and a portion of the public who are to bid. It is of course included in the highest bidder. The name of the highest bidder, and the amount of the bid, must be made public. The articles must be sold without reserve, and unless the vendor reserves an open bid he cannot bid himself or have the auctioneer or any one bid for him. There are cases on record where a bidder who bought it in and afterward sold it was brought against the vendor by the highest outside bidder for the article, and it was decided that he (the plaintiff) was the highest bidder and entitled to the article, against the vendor. Also, if an article is struck off to a person, and it is afterwards ascertained that the vendor or auctioneer practiced fraud, by holding himself, or had procured, or so repeatedly decided by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania that the purchaser should not be bound, but that the purchaser should as if he discovered the fraud practiced upon him must return or tender the articles to the vendor.

NEVER DO IT.—Never run after your hat when it blows off in the street. There's nothing that makes a man feel so foolish, or appear so ridiculous to others, as to pursue a flying hat, kicking, cantering back, especially if that hat belongs to the one who is chasing it. How to Explode a Lamp. The Scientific American gives some of the circumstances which lead to the explosion of kerosene lamps, the philosophy of all of them being that the flame may pass down the wick and ignite the vapor which accumulates in the upper portion of the lamp. This vapor is not explosive, as the term is ordinarily understood; but when it is confined so that the gases resulting from its combustion cannot escape freely into the open air, the vessel containing it will be shattered. The ignition of the vapor may be as follows:

- 1. A lamp may be standing on a table or mantel, and a slight puff of air from the open window or door may cause an explosion.
2. A lamp may be taken up quickly from a table or mantel and instantly exploded.
3. A lamp is taken out into the entry, where there is a draft, or out of doors, and an explosion ensues.
4. A lighted lamp is taken up a flight of stairs, or is raised quickly to place it on the mantel, resulting in an explosion.
5. A lamp is taken up into the air, where there is a draft, or out of doors, and an explosion ensues.
6. A lamp is taken up a flight of stairs, or is raised quickly to place it on the mantel, resulting in an explosion.
7. Sometimes a thoughtless person puts a small wick into a large burner, thus leaving considerable space along the edge of the wick. An old burner with its jet-draft clogged up, which rightfully should be thrown away, is sometimes continued in use, and the final result is an explosion.
