Ohio Republican Convention.

CLEVELAND, August 1.—The republican state convention was called to order at eleven o'clock to-day.

The meeting was held at the convention hall, and the convention adjourned till two p. m.

The convention reassembled at two p. m. Gen. J. A. Garfield was appointed permanent chairman.

The national expression of confidence in Hayes and the republican party following is the portion relating to gold and silver.

Resolved, That we are in favor of both silver and gold as money; that both shall be a legal tender for the payment of all debts, except where otherwise specifically provided by law.

Resolved, That we view with alarm the present disturbed condition of the country, as evidenced by the extensive strikes of workmen, and followed by the destruction of life and property in different parts of the country, and while we deprecate each and every resort to violence and disorder, and cordially approve of the action of our national and state authorities in their efforts to enforce the supremacy of the law.

Resolved, That we most heartily sympathize with the condition of honest and industrious laborers who are willing to work but remain unemployed, or are employed at wages inadequate to comfort and independence, and as an earnest of our desire to find a remedy for their condition, we recommend:

First, That congress establish a national bureau of industry.

Second, That congress exert its authority over all national highways of trade by prescribing and enforcing such reasonable regulations as will tend to promote safety of travel and secure fair returns for capital invested and fair wages to employees, preventing mismanagement and improper discriminations, and the improvement of stockholders, shippers and employees.

Third, That provision be made for statutory arbitration between employers and employees to a just controversy, reconcile interests, and establish justice and equity between them.

The following ticket was nominated: Governor, W. H. West, of Bellefonte; Lieutenant Governor, Ferd Voelker; Supreme Judge, W. V. Johnson; Attorney General, Geo. H. Nash; Clerk of the Supreme Court, Dwight Crowell; School Commissioner, J. T. Luckens; Board of Public Works, A. W. Luckey; Chief Reporter, The Agricultural Reports from the whole country to the department at Washington, show returns as follows:

The winter wheat already harvested and the spring wheat indicate an unprecedented yield, which will not fall short of 525,000,000 bushels, an increase of over 50,000,000 bushels over last year.

The surplus available for foreign exportation, will not be short of 100,000,000 bushels, an increase of 10,000,000 bushels over the highest surplus ever known in the country.

The Eastern war, according to official information, has very disastrously affected the wheat production of southern Russia. It is therefore evident that all the wheat which can be exported by the United States for exportation will be demanded, as the movements for exportation of crops have an important bearing upon the business and finance of the country, and as the time for their movement is near at hand, some apprehension is expressed in government circles that the recent disturbances of the railroads may lead to embarrassment which will detract much from the beneficial effects anticipated from the shipment of the abundant crop of the present year.

A SWINDLER.—One of the latest and shrewdest schemes of swindlers lately took place in Cleveland, Ohio. A stranger appeared at a saloon having in his possession several boxes which he claimed contained valuable jewels, which he would like to keep safe for a time. For this purpose he engaged a room and had the boxes placed in it. He occupied the room a day or so, and then left, leaving his things there. In the course of a day or so he returned, saying that he had been detained a way by business but would pay for the room all the same.

While he was making this explanation a second stranger, who spoke very broken English appeared and called for a drink. He had no money but would like to sell a large diamond cross which he wore. The first stranger examined it, and said that as an expert he should regard the cross as worth at least \$1,000. The price of the article \$2,000, and if the saloon keeper would let him have that amount he would go to at once to the bank, draw some money and return \$500 for the favor. The money was furnished, with the exception of \$17, and the two strangers departed—never to return. It took their host but a few minutes to see that he had been victimized, and he rushed for the boxes of jewelry to find them filled with stones.

Ohio Republican Convention.

A serious tragedy occurred at Sharon, Pa., on the 4th ult. William Bell, a prominent citizen about 60 years old, was driving in a wagon which contained some scrap iron, and the noise frightened the horse of Kate McGilvery, who asked him to stop till she could pass, but he failed to hear her for some time, owing to his deafness. She however, attributed his delay to malice, and told her father, who went in search of Bell and knocked him down. This made the latter's son so mad that he started out after McGilvery and threw a brass weight at his head. At last accounts McGilvery was dead, his daughter crazy, and young Bell arrested for murder.

Tim President's proclamation, says the New York Tribune, sounds well, but there are no bayonets to enforce it. The American army has been paroled down by the Democratic House until it is a corporal's guard besides the armies of foreign nations. Yet that little army has to patrol the Rio Grande, garrison a long chain of forts on the Western plains, guard the transcontinental routes of New Mexico, prevent the return of Sitting Bull to the Yellowstone Valley, fight with Joseph in Idaho, and now prevent domestic violence in this State. The Government ought to have material as well as moral power in an emergency like this.
