A clearer sign of the times is the absence of bitter partisan feeling. Not since the days of Monroe, when party lines were scarcely visible, have we had so little of the rancor of partisanship as now.

There is a strong current of public sentiment in favor of having our gross backlog of railroad national highways, and making their operation an offense against the General Government, and the officers amenable to the United States law.

It is pleasant to learn from the Pittsburgh Commercial Gazette that the destruction of railroad property in that city has been largely arrested. Instead of 17 locomotives destroyed there were but 11, and about 1,000 freight cars instead of 3,000.

James Miller, interested in a portion of the property of the first bank, has shown that a man in possession of business who may purchase out of the hands of a lender and property to his wife may be held in the event of a business failure, to have withdrawn funds in which an assignee in bankruptcy may lay claim in behalf of creditors.

A few days since a terrible forest fire swept through portions of Westmoreland, destroying the lives of many persons, and a burning numerous dwellings. In every direction hundreds of head animals, such as cows, pigs and sheep, lie scattered, adding greatly to the horrors of the desolate scene.

We notice in our exchanges that the creditors who sell a two dollar note for one dollar, sell three cents for ten cents and then give the money back to the purchaser but finally get five dollars for a claim that is worth five cents.
