The grand jury at Pittsburg ignored the bill against General Pearson for murder in causing the troops to fire on the July rioters. At the rate things are going it won't be long before judges and juries will be indicted by inmates of jails and penitentiaries.

The result of the election everywhere indicates that the Republicans could have swept the field with very slight additional exertions. The temporary reverse it has encountered will serve to heal the dissensions which have existed, and we expect good to come out of the apparent disaster, if anything like prudent counsels prevail.

In 1874 the Democrats elected their State ticket—Lieutenant Governor, Auditor General, and Secretary of Internal Affairs—by an average majority of 4,500. They carried, at the same time, the Legislature which elected William A. Wallace to the United States Senate.

A SENATORIAL dispatch from Washington states that Senator Conkling has declared war against Hayes. Time will show whether he will carry on the war according to his manifesto. It is understood that Mr. C. wants to dictate who shall be the officers in the New York Custom House; and because he don't get his own way in this matter, he intends to carry the war into the Senate, so as if possible, to prevent the confirmation of the new appointments made by the President.

Of Pennsylvania little need be said. Without leaders—without organization—in the face of a heavy vote recruited from the Republican ranks and given to the Greenback labor and prohibition parties—with all these drawbacks against a united, enthusiastic Democratic party, to say nothing of the divisions in the party in Philadelphia, we may well feel proud that the grand old organization maintained its position as well as it did, and thankful that our defeat is not so bad after all.

Good Advice.—Ex-Senator Chandler had something wise to say about farming as well as something significant about politics, when he addressed his neighbors at his farm in Michigan, not long ago. He declared that farming was not only the oldest but the most respectable occupation known to man. "If I had a boy to-day," he exclaimed, "I would rather put him on an eighty-acre lot that had never had a plough or an axe upon it, than place him in the best Government office in the land."
