One bushel of sugar beets mixed with nine bushels of apples makes a older richer and of a superior flavor to that made from apples alone.

To prevent iron rusting give it a coat of ligseed oil and whiting mixed together in the form of paste. It is easily removed and preserve iron from resting for years.

To Purify Water .- Sprinkle a little powdered alum in the water' and in a few hours all impurities will be precipitated to the bottom, leaving the water pure and clear as spring water.

A small bag of hops, say as large as one's head, placed in a bin of grain, It is said, will dostroy weevil and othor insects which find a lodgement. It costs but little and is easily tried.

Hore to Get Rid of Ants .- Wash your shelves down clean and, while damp, rub fine salt on them quite thick and let it remain on them for a time, and red auts will disappear.

To Wash Red Table Linen .- Use topid water, with a little powdered borar, which serves to set the color wash the linen separatly and quickly. using very little soap ; rinse in tepid water, containing a little boiled starch ; hang up to dry in the shade and iron when alomost dry.

Victorias .- One cupful sugar, one teaspoon soda dissolved in one pint of water ; beat butter and sugar together, add the water, stir in enough flour to make a thin batter ; bake on a hot griddle without turning over ; butter each one the instant it is done: nice for lunch.

For Sick Horses .- Linseed oil is not only a valuable restorative for sick borses, but is exceedingly uses ful in cases of inflamation of the membranes peculiar to the organs of respiration and digestion; it shields and lubricates the same, tranquilizes the frritable state of the parts and favors healthy action. Put a couple of bandfuls of seed into a bucket and pour a gallon and a half of boiling water upon it; cover it up for a short time, then add a couple of quarts of cold water, when it will be ready for use. In case of an irritating cough, add some honey. But better still is to raise plenty of sunflowers and save the seed to feed to your young hors-

peaches, cut them in balves' and remove the stones ; allow one pound 1853. sted sugar to one pound o peaches; crack one quart of stones extract the kernels, and remove the dark skins ; then boil them in just water enough to cover them ; boil until soft ; let them steep in a covered bowl until needed ; place the sugar and peaches alternately in layers in the porcelain kettle, let it warm up slowly, then strain the kernels and add the water (the kernels may also be added if desired) ; let them boil slowly until the penches are clear and to reacher, will sell goods entirely for CASH tender; it takes about half an hour;

Time for Draining Swamps .-There is no better time than the present for draining wet ground Swamps are now dry; work is not pressing; every foot of land a farmer owns should be made profitable, and if this season is permitted to pass and this work neglected. this work neglected, a year must clapse before the opportunity returns The first work is to cut the brushes and weeds. If cut this month, these will probably be killed outright and nothing more be seen of them. This dense growth should now be mown with a heavy scythe or brushhook close to the ground, the tursocks cut off with a grub-hoo or an adze, and the whole left to dry, when upon some rainy day, it should be burned in heaps. By choosing a damp or wes day for this work there will be no danger of the fire escaping to other ground or to the fence rows and dolog damage, or of burning the aurface of the swamp too deeply and inuring it. When the surface is burned of the ground should be grabbed, where this is necessary, and plowed. After this a heavy barrow should be used to tear the rough clods to places. No better plan then this can be perned to reduce the surface to a con-lition of usofulness. Constant har-gowing will be needed, both to break up the surface and to destroy the specified woods.
