One Hundred and Ten Years Old. Opposite this place, rising up almost perpendicularly from the shore of the Susquehanna, and attaining a height of about three hundred feet, is an extended eminence called Blue Hill, which for a considerable distance is very similar in appearance to the Palisades of the Hudson. The level surface at the top of this mountain contains several highly cultivated farms and a few houses, one of which, until Tuesday last, was occupied by an aged colored man named William Cooper. It is asserted that Co. or was born in July, 1768, which made him over one hundred and ten years of age at the time of his death. Of his early history little is known, as his memory of late years had not been very clear. He was always positive about his age, however, and claimed to have a record of the date of his birth; but from that time up to about fifty years ago his history is comparatively a blank. He said he had never been a slave, or at least had never been looked upon or treated as such by the families with whom he had lived. Cooper lived in Wilkes Barre for many years, and was well known here. About the year 1858, he moved from Wilkes Barre and took up his abode on Blue Hill, where he had remained but a short time when he won the affection of and married the widow Costly, they having lived happily until his death. He had a little garden attached to his home and employed most of his time in its cultivation. He often came to Sunbury and his gray hairs and bent form attracted no little attention. He was possessed of considerable intelligence and was quite interesting in his conversation. His widow has reached the advanced age of ninety years, and must soon follow her departed husband. His remains were interred in the cemetery at Shannokin Dam to-day. - Sunbury Daily Press.
