

### Farm, Home, &c.

A little soft soap on the crook gate or barn door hinges, and the unnecessary noise and wear.

"Farming don't pay," says the farmer who spends half of his time afloat about town instead of attending to his crops and stock.

A diaryman writes to the *Practical Farmer* that milking at a time of day when the flies are the worst will decrease the flow of milk twenty-five per cent.

Learn well your calling, practice it thoroughly, that it may be made profitable to you. Stick to your business. Do not be called away from your farm. A venture in other pursuits might lose your all.

It is a mistake to expect to succeed at farming without plenty of good honest work. Some men may have made money without work, but no farmer ever made a crop without a good deal of that indispensable article.

The *Scientific American* announces that half the vinegar now sold is rank poison, and a Massachusetts chemist states that out of twelve jars of pickles put up by different wholesale dealers, he found copper in ten of them.

**How to Make Cider Vinegar.**—To make good cider the essentials are: Good cider, a temperature of about 70 degrees, and complete exposure to the air as possible. The device offered acts upon the principal of exposing cider to the air in shallow trays. A cask half filled with cider, with bung out, in a warm room, will become vinegar much sooner than a full cask, bunged up in a cool cellar. Vinegar-making is a sort of fermentation, greatly facilitated by a kind of low, microscopic plant, popularly known as the "mother" of vinegar. Placing cider in old casks containing this, and mixing cider with old vinegar, hastens the process.

**Visiting Farms.**—A professional duty which every good farmer, in the early fall, is to visit some of the best farms in his county or State, and take a few field lessons in agriculture. The illustrated farm journal is very good and pays abundantly. But there is nothing like a morning's talk with a live farmer among his stock and crops, to stir up one's pure mind by way of remembrance and put him upon improvements at home. If you have been thinking for years of draining a field, go to some farmer who has a job of draining on hand, or completed, and study the process and its results. Such visits are not only a needed recreation that a busy farmer is entitled to, but profitable in many ways. They give new facts, show one new implements, and new methods of culture, and help to economize labor and make money. Think twice before saying you cannot afford the time. Certainly you cannot afford to do without these visits.—*American Agriculturist.*

**Farm Experiments.**—Facts and observations constitute the foundation on which rests our knowledge of the things which surround us in the world. Experiments carefully performed and the surrounding circumstances carefully noted, are the only reliable means we have of increasing our knowledge of farming. While the great truths of vegetable life and growth are well established and admitted by all who cultivated the ground, yet there are many questions which have important bearings on farm profits that remain unsettled to this day. These can be determined only by carefully conducted experiments. By this we mean that we must have the facts fairly stated, and all the circumstances under which the facts occurred faithfully detailed. Facts alone do not always lead to truth. We remember, in our early life, to have heard a firm belief in witchcraft triumphantly appeal to facts in proof of his theory. His cream was bewitched, and the good wife had labored two hours at the churn with no sight of butter. Deciding that it was a clear case of bewitching, he determined to apply the proper remedy. The red-hot horseshoe with the appropriate ceremony, was plunged into the churn, after which ten minutes churning brought the butter. The circumstance of the temperature of cream being overlooked, his fact did not prove the bewitching of the cream. To prove the infallibility of the moon, a man said he covered his barn with oak shingles—on one side he put on in the light of the moon, the other in the dark. The first winter the other side yielded abundantly.
