Hard Ginger Snaps.—One pound of flour, half pound of butter, half pound of brown sugar, two table-spoonfuls good ginger, one table-spoonful cloves, and molasses enough to make a stiff dough.

Graham Biscuit.—The about a quart of flour add one teaspoonful of salt, one of soda, two of cream-tar. one table-spoonful of sugar. one of lard, and wet up with water. Bake in a quick oven.

Doughnuts.—One cup of warm milk, one-third cup of lard or butter, one cup of yeast, one teaspoonful of salt. Let this rise over night. In the morning add one cup of sugar, one egg, one teaspoonful of cinnamon. Let it rise, then out and fry.

Pumkin Pie.—One quart of stowed pumkin, stowed until it is just soft enough to go through the colander. Add four eggs, one piec rich milk (cream is better) a pint of butter the size of an egg, (more or richer,) one nutmeg, sugar and salt to taste.

The Management of Horses.—They should be fed in proportion to their work. An idle team may be wintered upon good hay alone; when working lightly a feed of grain at noon will be sufficient, with hay morning and at night. With heavy work, ten quarts of ground corn and oat, and chaffed straw or corofodder, will be good feeding, and in many cases, for small horses, less will do. God grooming is necessary for health in winter. Ground gypsum spread upon the floors will prevent the pungent odor common to stables. This vapor of ammonia is hurtful to horses' eyes, and the frequent cause of ophthalmia, and resulting in blindness, in which so many horses are troubled. Throw a few pauls of water upon the floor first, and then scatter around a shovelful of the gypsum. Fresh air should enter the stables at the bottom and the foul air escape at the top. Make small sliding doors for ventilation, and cover them with wire netting or lath to exclude vermin.—Agriculturalist.

Milk for Fattening Fowls.—What a different taste a few, nicely and quickly fattened fowl has, when served on the table, compared to one which has been forced to scratch for all its living, and then is consigned to the spit in anything but a fit condition for food. Farmers realize the importance of fattening quickly when feeding beefs for the butcher, yet many do not seem to realize the fact that what holds good with that kind of meat is equally true when applied to fowls. Tender and juicy are results of fattening quickly, while mere ordinary flavor and want of tenderness result from letting fowls run until wanted for use on the table. To enable one to fatten fowls or chicks quickly, it is absolutely necessary to give such fowl as will accomplish the purpose best, and to this end we unhesitatingly recommend plenty of milk in any state, from fresh to thick. This should be fed in connection with a grain diet, for one counteracts any possible deleterious influence of the other. If kept in a darkened place and fed unsparingly on milk, with grain in proper proportions, you will soon have something very choice to offer up on your tables, to your friends, as well as to your family. When milk is fed, no water is required for fattening fowls.—American Poultry Yard.

Live Stock.—There are two kinds of live stock that it does not pay to keep after it has become old; these are sheep and poultry. A vigorous weeding-out should be made each year. There is no better time for this than in the fall when pasture begins to fail and feeding becomes necessary. Sheep should be so kept through the winter that they will be ready for the butcher at the end of the feeding season, so that at least with a little extra feed, they may go into the market. A sheep attains its prime at about four or five years, and from that time they begin to gradually decline. Their teeth become defective and give way, so that it requires extra care and feeding to keep them in good or even ordinary condition. It will sometimes pay to give the extra care to a ewe that has proved an extra breeder nurse, but those that do not thus distinguish
